Child molester given 38 years in prison

Oaks man convicted on 89 separate counts

VENTURA — A Thousand Oaks man and longtime Boy Scouts leader was sentenced Friday to serve 38 years in prison for repeatedly molesting two young girls over several years.

Charles Robert Ceballos, 58, had been convicted after a trial in August of 39 separate child molestation charges.

Ceballos, who a probation report says suffers from arthritis and is overweight and has several wounds, is likely to spend the rest of his life behind bars.

He will be eligible for parole in 19 years, when he is 77 years old. At that time, his victims, who are now 11 and 15 years old, will be 30 and 34 years old, respectively.

Deputy District Attorney Michael Frawley asked Superior Court Judge Robert Bradley to give Ceballos a prison term long enough so the victims would "not have to see him on the street until they are well into their adult years."

Time is not going to heal the victims' emotional scars," Frawley said.

In a 19-page letter to Judge Bradley, Ceballos maintained his innocence and denied the

charges, as he had at his two-week trial. He accused the victims' aunt — who had urged the girls to tell police of the molestations — of manipulating the girls and of "brainwashing" them.

"I feel at this time as I have all along that I am innocent and a victim of circumstances," Ceballos wrote. He did not address the judge on Friday, and neither did the victims. Ceballos did not openly react to Bradley's lengthy sentence.

In his letter, Ceballos called

institutionalization "a fate worse than death itself."

Ceballos' attorney, Jenny Scovis of Thousand Oaks, asked the judge for leniency, saying Ceballos is not a "violent" or "mean" man.

"To do anything else would be sentencing him to a death sentence," Scovis said.

Bradley also told Ceballos to pay \$10,000 to the state victims' Restitution Fund, ordered \$225 in fines and ordered him to submit samples of his blood and saliva for testing to check for

various diseases.

Using an unusual approach, prosecutors had charged Ceballos, a former Burbank plating company owner and former Conejo Valley Boy Scouts leader, with 91 child molestation charges in anticipation of a crucial state Supreme Court decision handed down last April that states child victims who are molested repeatedly over a long period of time do not have to specify the exact time and place of each assault.

The girls testified against Ce-

ballos, who was arrested Jan. 18.

The jury also found true several special allegations that the molestation included intercourse with one girl and that the crimes were committed under duress or with force. The two charges for which he was acquitted were conceded by the prosecution because Ceballos was out of town at the time of the alleged incidents.

Jurors said after the trial that they believed the girls and not Ceballos.

Molestation verdict guilty

TO man convicted of 89 counts of sexually abusing 2 girls

Jurors convicted a Thousand Oaks man of 89 counts of child molestation Wednesday.

Charles Robert Ceballos, 58, didn't react as the verdicts droned on, but appeared shocked when Superior Court Judge Robert C. Bradley ordered him jailed immediately.

Ceballos protested that he needed to wind up business at the company he owns.

"You'll have to find someone else to do it," Bradley replied.

Deputy District Attorney Michael Frawley asked for Ceballos to be held until his sentencing on Sept. 21 because he feared Ceballos might try to flee, since many of the

charges required Ceballos to go to prison.

Jurors convicted Ceballos of molesting two girls — a 15-year-old who Frawley said was molested for nine years, and a 11-year-old girl who Frawley said was molested for five years.

Frawley said the verdicts would help relieve the victims, who reported the molestations in January.

"They've been through hell for the past eight months," he said.

Defense attorney Jenny Scovis said she plans to appeal the verdicts, saying she believes Ceballos is innocent.

Jurors acquitted Ceballos on two counts.

Frawley had asked the jury to dismiss one count because he discovered Ceballos had been out of town during month he was accused of molesting the girls on that particular count.

Jurors said afterwards they couldn't reach agreement on the one other count.

Jurors said they simply didn't believe Ceballos, who denied the molestations when he took the stand.

Ceballos could face up to 296 years in prison, but Bradley said his sentence would be based not on the total number of charges, but on the fact that the molestations continued for years.

Thousand Oaks man convicted in 89 counts of child molestation

VENTURA — A Thousand Oaks man was convicted of child molestation in a case that sent him to prison for the rest of his life.

Charles Robert Ceballos, 59, convicted on all but two counts of child molestation, Ventura Superior Court Judge Robert Bradley said. Ceballos repeatedly molested two girls over a period of several years.

Ceballos testified at the trial denying the accusations, saying he was out of town on several of the occasions when molestations occurred. But jurors said they did not believe him. "We all believed the child was molested," jurors told Ventura County Deputy District Attorney Michael Frawley after the ver-

dict was read.

"I believe he was prepared to say what he thought was believable and it wasn't honest," said juror Jeanette Case of Simi Valley.

After reading each verdict, Superior Court Judge Robert Bradley revoked Ceballos' \$10,000 bail despite defense attorney Jenny Scovis' protests and ordered Ceballos jailed on the spot.

Sentencing is scheduled for Sept. 21.

"To say this is a custody case (prison time) is an understatement," the judge said in ordering Ceballos jailed immediately.

"It's a victory for those victims," Frawley said.

The maximum prison term for all but 13 of the 89 charges is eight years in prison, and the remaining 13 counts carry a

maximum of three years in prison, Frawley said. The maximum term for all the charges adds up to 647 years.

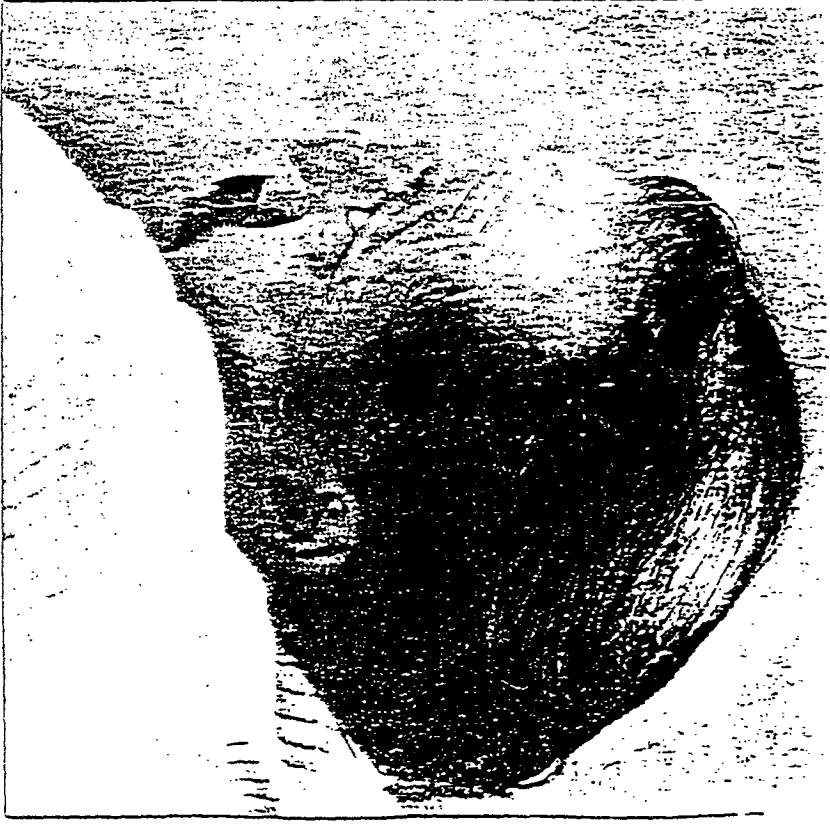
The jury also found true several special allegations that the molestations included intercourse and that the crimes were committed under duress or with force.

Judge Bradley said the vast number of counts against Ceballos would not dictate the sentence he pronounces. Rather, the judge said, the fact that the crimes continued for many years will have a "substantial impact" on Ceballos' sentence.

Defense attorney Scovis said she will appeal the verdict. "I don't see how they found him guilty. I really believe he is innocent," she said.

Jury selection begins for man facing 91 molestation counts

Ruling that victims need not remember time, place of alleged assaults to play role

VENTURA — A Ventura Superior Court judge began questioning potential jurors Monday in the trial of a Thousand Oaks man who faces 91 separate charges of child molestation.

Prosecutors originally charged Charles Ceballos, 58, with the unusually high number of counts in anticipation of a recent state Supreme Court decision handed down in April that states child victims who are asked repeatedly over a long period of time do not have to recall the time and place of

Nov. 6 election, the Gov. George Deukmejian. each assault, officials said. Ceballos is accused of repeatedly molesting two girls from the time they were in first grade through his arrest this January. The girls are now 11 and 15 and have testified against him in court.

Ceballos is free in lieu of \$10,000 bail and an order that he cannot contact the alleged victims, according to documents filed in Ventura Superior Court High court case.

The case before the state Supreme Court, People vs. San Diego teacher Mark E. Jones, led to a ruling that child witnesses of repeated molestation over a long period of time

do not have to recall exact places and dates of the alleged acts for their testimony to be sufficient evidence, said Deputy District Attorney Vincent O'Neill. O'Neill filed a brief before the high court as a "friend of the court" for the California District Attorneys Association.

Before the Jones case, appeals court judges were split on the question of whether child witnesses had to distinguish details of each act, O'Neill said. Now, witnesses must specify the types of acts, the frequency and general time frame.

Deputy District Attorney Michael Frawley said the 91 charges were filed for one alleged act of molestation each month for both girls from the time they recalled an early incident until Ceballos was ar-

rested. While the ruling makes it easier for prosecutors to get the children's evidence before a jury, prosecutors still must convince jurors to believe the child instead of the accused, O'Neill said.

Frawley said the important part of the Ceballos case is who the jurors believe — Ceballos or the girls. Defense position. Thousand Oaks defense attorney Jenny Scovis unsuccessfully sought last month to have the charges dropped, calling a preliminary hearing March 16 in Ventura Municipal Court a "farce." Scovis' request, which Judge Robert Bradley denied, was based on the notion that Ceballos could not defend himself against acts vaguely de-

scribed in the girls' testimony, according to court records. Scovis argued Monday that Ceballos is improperly charged, because the alleged acts are a continuous course of conduct. Judge Bradley said it was up to the prosecutor's office to bring charges.

The trial is expected to last between two and three weeks. Frawley said that if he is convicted of all the charges, Ceballos could legally face "hundreds of years" in prison. O'Neill predicted that even if defendants are convicted of dozens of molestation counts, judges will hand down sentences that fall within what he called the "normal" length of a sentence child molesters in similar cases receive. "The judge will draw the line somewhere," he said.

WHURRY PARK — With a bit of deft handling and some special materials, Viola continues the tradition of preserving ways to keep old and fragile items from fading or being stained.

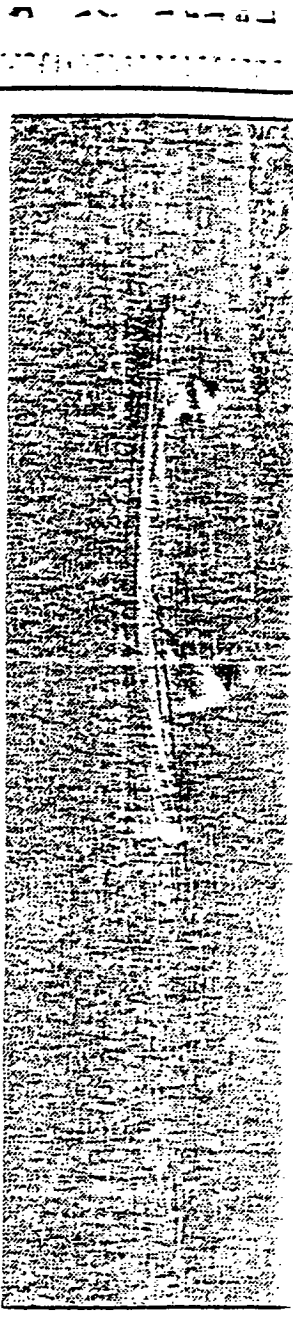

For Thousand Oaks attorney Jenny Scovis, who is representing Ceballos, the Supreme Court decision was "distressing."

"It's going to impact me pretty badly on this case," Scovis said. Ceballos is scheduled to be tried Aug. 6 on 91 charges of repeatedly molesting two girls, now ages 11 and 15, over a period of several years.

Henke-Dobroth said the girls claim they were molested more than once a week. The District Attorney's Office decided to file one or two charges for every month dating back to 1984, the outer edge of the statute of limitations.

Henke-Dobroth said the girls remember some specifics about the molestations, but not many.

Defense attorneys have argued that a lack of specificity handicaps an accused molester who is trying to present an alibi or other aspects of a defense. Appellate courts throughout California have split on the issue.

"How can anyone defend themselves against an allegation when they (the children) don't remember the time, the day or the specifics?"

Scovis asked, "I don't think that's really fair."

That is precisely the question the Supreme Court tackled when it decided the appeal of Mark Edwin Jones, a San Diego schoolteacher whose 13-year-old victim was vague about specific molestations.

Jones was convicted of molesting the boy six times, although the child said it happened on countless occasions. An appeals court upheld two counts — saying the child could remember specifically the first and last times he was molested — but threw out the convictions for everything in between.

Chief Justice Malcolm M. Lucas, who wrote the majority opinion in the 5-2 decision, said the issue presented "difficult questions," but could be resolved in favor of the prosecution.

While noting that child-molestation victims often cannot distinguish between separate acts of molestation because of the frequency with which they occur, Lucas wrote that "to hold that such testimony, however credible and substantial, is inadequate to support molestation charges would anomalously favor the offender who subjects his victim to repeated or continuous as-

saults.

"This opinion attempts to accommodate all legitimate ... concerns without immunizing resident child molesters from prosecution," the opinion says.

Lucas wrote that the child witness must be specific about the type of act committed, the number of times it happened, and the general time period, to make sure it falls within the statute of limitations.

Since more specific items of information are not elements of the crime, they are not necessary to sustain a conviction, Lucas wrote.

Vincent J. O'Neill, Ventura County chief deputy district attorney, argued the Jones case before the Supreme Court on behalf of the California District Attorneys Association. O'Neill said he is pleased that the ruling eliminates a trial court practice of imposing a higher standard for child witnesses.

"If the jury believes the child, that should be sufficient for the conviction to be upheld," O'Neill said.

A major point in O'Neill's argument — and one adopted by the Supreme Court — was that children are no less credible than adults.

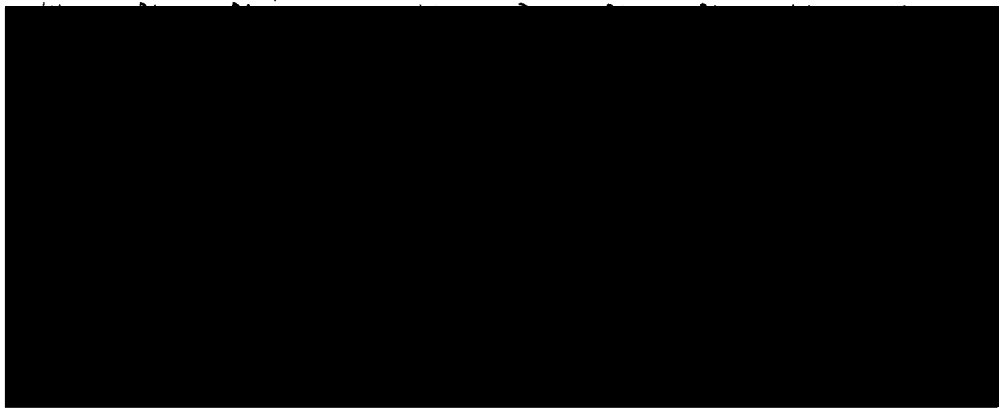
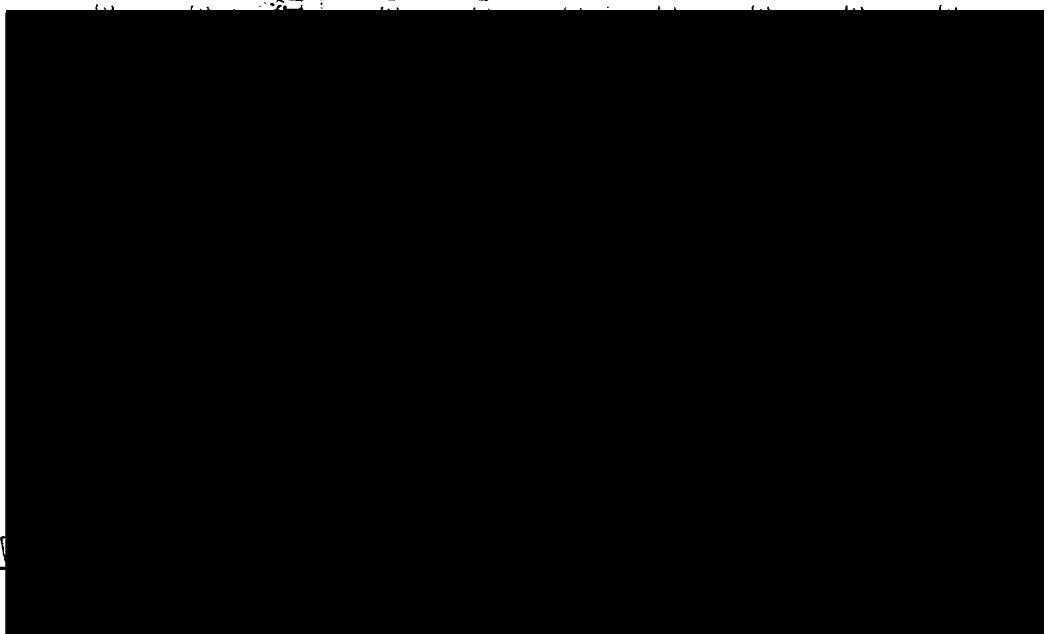
