Scoutmaster gets 15 years for sexually abusing boys

PALMOUTH — A Pendleton County judge has sentenced former Scoutmaster Daniel Newman to 15 years in prison for sexually abusing young boys, completing a plea-bargain arrangement that spanned three counties.

Newman had earlier entered an Alford plea to 10 counts of sodomy and sex abuse in Pendleton County. On Thursday, Circuit Judge Robert McGinnis gave Newman a 15-year sentence, which will be served at the same time as similar sentences in Kenton and Campbell counties.

Newman pleaded guilty to six counts of sodomy and sex abuse in Kenton County and to five counts in Campbell

County. He received a 15-year sentence Monday in Kenton County and the same sentence Tuesday in Campbell County.

The three-county plea bargain allowed Newman to enter an Alford plea in exchange for a total sentence of 15 years. In an Alford plea, a defendant does not admit guilt but concedes the state has enough evidence to convict him.

Police had charged Newman with abusing a number of young boys he had met through his work in the Scouts and in the Big Brothers/Big Sisters organization.

They said the attacks took place in Newman's home, at Kincaid Lake State Park and at garages he rented in Covington and Ft. Thomas.

Campbell court gives Newman 15 years also

Former Scoutmaster Daniel Newman was sentenced to 15 years in prison after pleading guilty in a Campbell County courtroom to sexually abusing young boys.

Circuit Judge Leonard Kopowski on Tuesday accepted Newman's Alford plea, in which he admits that the state has enough evidence to convict him, but he can continue to maintain his innocence.

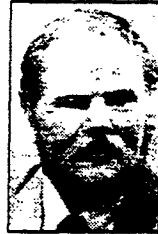
The plea is part of a three-county agreement that calls for Newman to enter Alford pleas to 21 counts of sodomy and sex abuse. In return, he will be sentenced to a total of 15 years in prison.

Before passing sentence, Kopowski noted that families of the victims had agreed to the settlement.

On Monday, Kenton County Circuit Judge James Gilliece also sentenced Newman to 15 years in prison. Newman is expected to receive the same sentence in Pendleton County, where he has entered an Alford plea to 10 charges.

Newman told Kopowski he was pleading guilty because he

faced a much longer prison term if he were convicted of the charges.

"It's more or less for the time that's involved," he said. "I just want to get it over with."

Newman, 33, of Covington, must serve half of his 15-year sentence before he is eligible for parole. He will be credited with the days he has served in jail since his arrest in September 1988.

Police had charged Newman with molesting the boys in a garage he rented in Ft. Thomas. He had met the boys through his work in the Cub Scouts, in the Big Brothers/Big Sisters organization, and through their friendship with Newman's two sons, police said.

Charges in the other counties says Newman molesting boys during Cub Scout overnight camping trips to Kincaid Lake State Park near Falmouth, at his home, in his car, and in a garage he rented in Covington.

Former Cub Scout leader gets 15 years in sex case

A judge has sentenced a former Cub Scout leader to 15 years in prison for molesting boys.

Kenton County Circuit Judge James Gilliece on Monday followed terms of a plea bargain that call for Daniel K. Newman to receive a total of 15 years on sex charges in three counties.

Gilliece said the 15-year sentence he gave Monday should be served concurrently with sentences Newman is expected to receive in Campbell and Pendleton counties this week.

Newman, 33, of Covington, must serve half of his 15-year sentence before he is eligible for parole. Gilliece said Newman will be credited with the days he has served in jail since his arrest in September 1988.

Newman was accused of mo-

lesting boys during Cub Scout overnight camping trips to Kincaid Lake State Park near Falmouth. Police charged that other offenses occurred at Newman's home, in garages he rented in Covington and Ft. Thomas, and in his car.

Newman entered an Alford plea last month in Kenton County Circuit Court to four counts of first-degree sodomy and two counts of first-degree sexual abuse. The plea means he does not admit guilt but concedes evidence could convict him. The plea results in a conviction.

In return, Kenton County prosecutors dropped nine other counts and recommended a 15-year sentence. Newman had been facing life in prison.

Agreements with prosecutors from the other counties also were reached.

Newman faces five sex charges in Campbell County, where he is scheduled to enter an Alford plea and be sentenced today. He is scheduled to be sentenced Thursday in Pendleton County, where he entered an Alford plea to 10 counts.

Newman agreed to the plea bargains in the third day of a trial in Kenton County. Police produced a recently discovered hotel receipt signed by Newman they said corroborated stories by several young boys who said Newman had forced them to have sex with him.

Newman, dressed in a blue suit, stood quietly beside defense attorney Margo Grubbs during Monday's sentencing. He declined comment afterward.

Ms. Grubbs said Newman continues to maintain he is innocent.

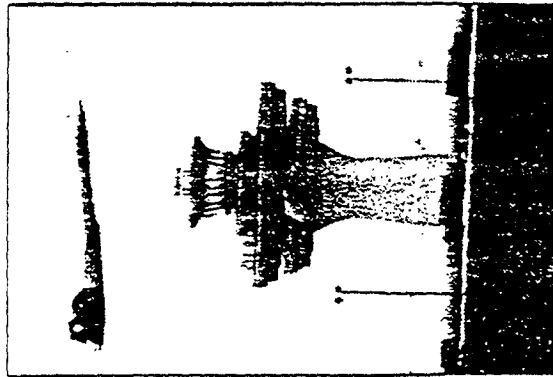

Ex-Scout leader agrees to 15-year prison term

A newly discovered hotel receipt signed by former Boy Scout leader Daniel Newman proved instrumental in Newman's decision to agree to a 15-year prison sentence Tuesday for sex related charges.

The receipt gave police the evidence they needed to corroborate stories by several young boys who said Newman had forced them to have sex with him.

"It changed from accusations by the boys to documentary evidence,"

said Margo Grubbs, Newman's attorney.

"When you study up on all the evidence, we decided with Dan ... that the weight of the evidence was more than we could overcome."

Newman, a former Boy Scout leader and Big Brother, entered an Alford plea late Tuesday to four counts of sodomy and two counts of sex abuse. In re-

turn, Assistant Kenton County Commonwealth Attorney Doug Crockett agreed to drop nine other counts and recommend a prison sentence of 15 years.

In an Alford plea, a person does not admit guilt but acknowledges that the state has enough evidence to convict him.

Kenton County Circuit Judge James Gillicee said he would accept the recommendation when he formally sentences Newman April 10.

reached with prosecutors in Pendleton and Campbell counties. The sentence would be concurrent.

Pendleton County Commonwealth Attorney Jack Keith Jr. said Newman has agreed to change his plea to 10 sex charges in Pendleton County in return for a 15-year sentence. Campbell County Commonwealth Attorney Lou Ball said he has reached the same agreement on the five sex charges against Newman in his county.

Newman will be eligible for parole after he serves half of his sentence.

Covington Police Sgt. Janet Radenheimer found the key evidence over the weekend.

One of the boys who said Newman molested him told investigators about taking a trip with Newman to a Kenton County hotel. After searching through receipts for about five hours, police found a receipt that matched the time, date and room number the boy had given investigators, Sgt. Radenheimer said.

Newman had not been charged in that specific incident, but the document contained enough evidence to corroborate the boy's story and impress the jurors, she said.

Newman had faced life in prison on the 30 counts of sodomy and sex abuse against him in the three counties.

Grothaus said Newman met some of the boys through his work as a Boy Scout troop leader and as a member of the Big Brothers/Big Sisters group.

The attacks took place at Newman's Covington home, at garages he owned in Covington and Ft. Thomas, and on camping trips to Kincaid Lake State Park, according to investigators. A dozen young boys between the ages of 9 and 14 were molested between 1985 and 1988, Sgt. Radenheimer said.

Before reaching the agreement, Grothaus, Sgt. Radenheimer and others involved in the investigation spoke to the vic-

tims and family members. All accepted it, Grothaus said.

One father, who asked not to be identified to protect his son, said the parents are glad to have the episode behind them. The parents wanted to save their sons the trauma of testifying about the abuse, the father said.

"One of them said 100 years wouldn't be enough for what he did, but it was worth 15 years to get out of this nightmare," he said.

Grothaus said he would not have made the agreement if the parents objected strongly.

"I would definitely consider it a victory — not only for the commonwealth, but also for the kids in this case," Grothaus said.

"I think it's safe to say they are all relieved that it's over and they can get on with their lives. These children have been through a lot. I don't think I've seen any individuals display courage like that in my life."

Newman, 33, has been in the Kenton County Jail since his arrest in September 1988. Jail officials have not been told when and to where he will be moved for his prison term.

Newman's trial on the Kenton County charges began last week, and was entering its third day when prosecutors told Ms. Grubbs they had new evidence.

After a day of discussions, the agreement was reached.

Before Newman entered his plea shortly before 7 p.m., he sat in the courtroom, handcuffed, talking to family members. He maintained his innocence.

"I don't want to" plea, he said quietly, adding that he didn't know why he was signing the agreement.

"It's too much," he said. "It'd take a week to explain it."

Ex-scout leader awaits 'day in court'

Jury selection began in Kenton County this morning in the case against former Cub Scout leader Daniel K. Newman, who is accused of molesting several young boys.

Grand juries in Kenton, Campbell and Pendleton counties have indicted Newman on a total of 35 counts of sodomy and sexual abuse. A trial last year in Pendleton County ended in a hung jury.

Newman, who has been in the Kenton County Jail since his arrest in September 1988, is anxious about the trial, said his court-appointed attorney, Margo Grubbs.

"He said to me, 'Don't even talk to me about plea bargains. I'm not going to plead guilty to something I didn't do,'" Ms. Grubbs said.

"He's been in jail for 17 months. He's sitting and waiting to have his day in court."

Ms. Grubbs said Newman has been unable to make his bond, which totals \$130,000 in the three counties.

In Kenton County, Newman faces 15 charges of sodomy and sexual abuse. Several young boys who range in age from 10 to 14 said Newman molested them between Sept. 1, 1985, and Sept. 6, 1988, according to a grand jury indictment. Some of the boys belonged to the Scout troop Newman led in Covington.

Newman, the former owner of a window-washing and janitorial business, faces 10 similar counts in Pendleton County and five counts in Campbell County. Neither county has scheduled a trial.

The charges against Newman originally sent shock waves through the Daniel Beard Boy Scout Council but had few long-range negative effects, said Bob Hopper, director of finance for the Cincinnati-based organization. Cub Scout Pack 735, which Newman

led, has survived after a rough few months, Hopper said.

In fact, 1989 was the council's 11th consecutive year of growth, he said. About 5,000 youngsters and 1,000 adults take part scouting in Northern Kentucky, he said.

"People are always very concerned, at any time something like this happens, that concern heightens," Hopper said. "But it's very hard to ensure our leaders are the kind we want our children with."

He said the council sponsors training and awareness classes for parents, scout leaders and the scouts. The goal is to prevent such abuse from occurring and to limit the instances in which such abuse could occur.

For instance, Hopper said, the council insists that two adults are at every meeting and along on every trip.

Jury selection is expected to last about a day and the trial is expected to last two three weeks.

Defense lawyer wants out of sexual molestation retrial

A Campbell County judge set a hearing date for March 16 on a lawyer's request to withdraw from a case involving charges of sexual molestation case against a former Cub Scout leader.

Attorney Thomas Willenborg is representing Daniel K. Newman, 32, of 2218 Scott St., who faces a total of 30 sexual abuse and sodomy charges in Kenton, Campbell and Pendleton counties.

Willenborg asked judges in the three counties to allow him to withdraw from the case because Newman cannot afford to pay him.

Newman's window-washing, janitorial and painting busi-

nesses have failed because he is in jail, his family says.

Willenborg's motion to withdraw from the case in Kenton County will be heard March 13 and in Pendleton County on March 16.

Pendleton County Circuit Court Judge Jack Arnold declared a mistrial in Newman's case in February after a jury was unable to reach a verdict on 10 counts of sexual abuse and sodomy. A new trial has not been scheduled.

Newman is expected to stand trial on similar charges March 20 in Campbell County and May 16 in Kenton County.

Two judges permit lawyer to withdraw from sex trial

Judges in two of the three counties where a former Cub Scout leader is accused of molesting boys have agreed to allow the defense attorney to withdraw from the case.

Covington attorney Thomas Willenborg filed motions to get out of the case because Daniel K. Newman can no longer afford to pay him.

Newman, 32, of 2218 Scott St., Covington, faces a total of 30 sexual abuse and sodomy charges in Kenton, Campbell and Pendleton counties.

Kenton County Circuit Judge James Gilliece and Campbell County Circuit Judge Leonard Kopowski have agreed to allow Willenborg to withdraw. Pendleton County Circuit Judge Jack Arnold will consider Willen-

borg's motion on Thursday.

Newman's family has said his window-washing, janitorial and painting businesses failed because he has been in jail.

Newman said in an affidavit filed in Kenton County Circuit Court that he has no income and that his wife has applied for public assistance. He said he owns no real estate or cars.

The only property he lists is a boat worth \$200.

"My wife is being evicted from our apartment," wrote Newman, who has two young sons. "All of our debts are long overdue since I have been in jail

since September 1988."

Gilliece ruled that Newman is eligible for a public defender in Kenton County. Gilliece said he hopes Newman's trial date of May 16 will stand.

Kopowski has delayed Newman's Campbell County trial, which was scheduled to begin March 20. Kopowski, who has not rescheduled the trial, will receive a report on Newman's eligibility for a public defender there at a pre-trial conference March 20.

A new trial date has not been scheduled in Pendleton County, where Arnold declared a mistrial in February after a jury was unable to reach a verdict on 10 counts of sexual abuse, sodomy, and complicity to commit sodomy.

32, of 2218 Scott St., Covington, is seeking public defenders to represent him on the 30 sexual abuse and sodomy charges he faces.

Newman's family has said his widow-washing, janitorial and painting businesses failed because he has been in jail since September. His bond exceeds \$100,000 cash for the three counties.

Arnold declared a mistrial in February after a Pendleton County jury was unable to reach a verdict on 10 counts of sexual abuse, sodomy and complicity to commit sodomy. Pendleton Commonwealth Attorney John Keith Jr. has said he intends to seek a new trial.

Newman is scheduled to stand trial in Kenton County on May 16. Circuit Judge James Gil-

lice has declared Newman eligible for a public defender in Kenton County.

Campbell County Circuit Judge Leonard Kopowski will receive a report on Newman's eligibility for a public defender at a pre-trial conference Monday. No trial date has been set in Campbell County.

Regarding a plea bargain, Newman said, "I don't think an innocent man has anything to bargain with. The only bargain would be for them."

Newman has steadfastly maintained his innocence. He said again Thursday that the boys who accused him are lying because he angered them in one way or another.

"I thank God there's people out there who believe in me," he said.

Newman also said he has changed his mind about wanting to take a polygraph test. Newman said during his trial in Pendleton County and again Thursday that he asked police officers, beginning with his first

interview with them, to give him a polygraph test to prove his innocence.

Newman said Thursday that he's been advised a polygraph is unreliable and can make an innocent man appear guilty. Also, he said he learned during the trial that polygraph results are inadmissible in court.

Commonwealth Attorney Keith has said Newman is lying. Keith said Newman first asked to take a polygraph test only a few days before his trial began. In what Keith interpreted as an attempt to delay the trial.

Newman predicted his accusers will break down on the witness stand in his next trial and recant their accusations. If he were guilty, Newman said, it should have been proven in Pendleton County.

"They built a case on me for five months, and it all fell through in Pendleton."

Molestation case suspect can no longer pay counsel

Pendleton County Circuit Judge Jack Arnold agreed Thursday to allow Thomas Willenborg to withdraw as Daniel K. Newman's lawyer. Willenborg said Newman can no longer afford to pay him.

Judges in Kenton and Campbell counties agreed earlier to allow Willenborg to withdraw. Newman said Thursday that he had no quarrel with Willenborg's decision to drop his case.

"It's just that we ran out of money," Newman said. "Tom bent over backward" to continue representing him, he added. "I can't expect him to work for nothing."

Newman said he has no lawyer. Newman.

Newman, in an interview in the Kenton County jail Friday, said at one point a plea bargain was discussed in which he would have pleaded guilty to "one count" and would have been put "in a hospital." But Newman said he's determined to prove he's innocent.

"I'm just not going to plead guilty to something I did not do," he said.

Newman has steadfastly maintained that his troubles began with a boy who was angry with him at having been banished from the Newman household after the boy was caught smoking marijuana. Later, other Scouts who also had been scolded or told not to come back to the Newman house joined in the plot to accuse him, he said.

"I'm a victim of a vicious plot," he said.

Although the accusers are not exactly the same set of boys in each of the counties in which Newman has been charged, some of the children are the same from county to county. Newman is accused of abusing boys at locations including his Scott Street home in Covington, a garage he rented in Ft. Thomas and Kincaid Lake State Park in Pendleton County.

"The same boy is involved in every one of these" charges, Newman said. He was referring to the 13-year-old Boy Scout, 12 at the time the offenses allegedly took place, whose accusations led to the first police charges.

"My wife would kill me if she heard me say this," Newman said, continuing: "Even now, after all this, I feel sorry for the kid." Newman said the boy, who acknowledged in court that he had been sexually abused by a brother several years ago, "is a troubled child."

"This can happen to any man that deals with kids," Newman said. "I just cannot believe that kids can be so vicious."

But prosecutor Keith, who expressed disappointment at the hung jury, said Newman is lying. Keith said the notion that four boys would make up stories as detailed as the accusations against Newman, then stick to those stories through interviews by police and through cross-examination during a trial, is "offensive to the intelligence."

Ex-Scout leader remains jailed

Daniel K. Newman says the tattoo on his right upper arm — "death before dishonor" — is the way he feels.

The 32-year-old former Covington Cub Scout leader's trial on 10 felony sexual abuse charges involving four Scouts ended Thursday in a hung jury in Pendleton County Circuit Court. A prosecutor said he plans to re-try the case.

But Newman, who has been in jail since his arrest in September, said he's looking for exoneration on all the charges. One of Newman's lawyers, Thomas Willenborg, said he discussed plea bargains with Pendleton Commonwealth Attorney John M. Keith Jr., but Newman's response was:

"I wouldn't take a year's probation if I had to plead guilty to what they have charged me with doing."

Covington and Kentucky State Police charged Newman with 35 sex crimes with children in Pendleton, Campbell and Kenton counties. Five of the charges were dismissed in Pendleton County as the trial began Monday, leaving 10 charges of sodomy, complicity to commit sodomy and sexual abuse.

Newman also faces a trial on five counts of similar charges in Campbell County March 20, and a trial on 15 counts of similar charges in Kenton County at a date yet to be determined.

Willenborg said one plea bargain he discussed with Keith involved dropping the felony charges of first-degree sodomy, which carry a possible life sentence, so that Newman might have been sentenced to 25 to 35 years in prison on lesser charges. That would have made him eligible for parole in five to seven years, Willenborg said.

Sodomy suspect: 4 boys are lying

Daniel K. Newman and his family say four boys who accused him of sex crimes are lying.

Newman took the stand Wednesday in Pendleton County Circuit Court in his own defense. The 32-year-old former Cub Scout leader said he has never harmed a child.

His two sons, wife, mother, sister, brother and niece also testified. His sons and niece contradicted earlier testimony by boys who said Newman sodomized them, abused them sexually and forced them to engage in sexual activity with each other on camping trips at Kincaid Lake.

Newman faces 10 counts of sodomy, sexual abuse and complicity to commit sodomy. The case is expected to go to the jury today following closing arguments.

Newman also faces trials in Kenton County on 10 counts of sodomy and sexual abuse and in Campbell County on five counts of sodomy and

sexual abuse.

Family members told the jury of seven men and seven women Wednesday that the charges have cost the Newman three service businesses — window-washing, janitorial and painting. The businesses failed because Newman was in jail in lieu of more than \$200,000 bond and large clients canceled jobs, they said.

Newman's sons said they have been attending school in Texas because of fears that harm would come to them. When the charges surfaced last fall, anonymous telephone callers threatened to hurt the boys and their mother, Nettie Newman, family members said.

Newman said he became a Cub Scout leader at the urging of his sons and Scout leaders. His downfall began when he befriended a boy he pitied, he said.

"I felt sorry for him," Newman said of the 13-year-old who brought the first accusa-

three times: 9-3 for conviction, 8-4 for conviction and 7-5 for conviction. A count source and a juror confirmed the vote count. Willenborg told the jury the power of suggestion accounted for the entire case. The boy whose accusations led to the first charges against Newman sought revenge because Newman caught him smoking marijuana and ended their friendship, Willenborg said.

Defense wanted mistrial because of possible

Fendleton County Circuit Judge Jack Arnold dismissed a juror who is the parent of a child involved in a sexual abuse case just before Daniel K. Newman case went to the jury.

Defense attorneys moved for a mistrial Thursday after Arnold advised them that Circuit Court Clerk Marvin Sullivan had learned of the juror's relationship.

Arnold denied the motion, simply striking the juror when it came time to call two alternates from the 14 member jury for the Newman case.

Thomas Willenborg, lead attorney for Newman, said later he was "floored" by developments — both the juror's handling of the problem and the juror's failure to acknowledge the relationship during questioning for jury selection.

"I have never ever seen such a thing," Willenborg said. "It was time for a mistrial."

Willenborg said Mrs. Newman had seen news accounts of the charges. Willenborg argued that Newman should open the beer but had to ask Newman to open while cooler bottles because he couldn't twist off the tops.

Sullivan said he made no attempt to deceive the jurors or spectators. He said the judge told him to draw one name and he made the physical motions of drawing only one name.

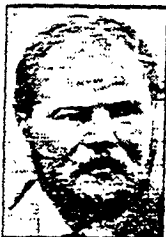
Pendleton judge declares mistrial

Daniel K. Newman's trial on 10 charges of sex crimes boiled down to a question of which children jurors believed.

Four boys accused the 30-year-old former Cub Scout leader of forcing them to participate in various sex acts on camping trips at Kincaid Lake State Park. Newman's sons and other family members insisted the incidents could not have happened.

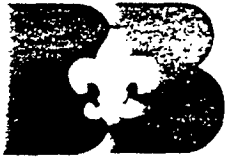
After more than 20 hours of testimony and two hours of deliberations in Pendleton County Circuit Court, the jury of seven women and five men could not decide who was telling the truth. Circuit Judge Jack Arnold declared a mistrial Thursday after jurors announced they were hopelessly deadlocked.

Pendleton Commonwealth Attorney John M. Keith Jr. said he will ask Arnold to schedule another trial on the charges of sodomy, complicity to commit sodomy and sexual abuse. Newman also faces trials in Kenton and Campbell counties on a total of 20 additional sex-related charges. Newman will be transferred from Pendleton County Jail to Kenton County Jail today. His trial in Kenton County begins Tuesday.

Prosecutors and detectives who worked on the case said they were disappointed and frustrated over the lack of a verdict. Newman also expressed frustration at the outcome.

"I was surprised that they even hung, with the evidence that they have," he said. "They would not do anything to let me prove myself."

Two testify scout leader abused them

Two boys testified in Pendleton County Circuit Court that their former Cub Scout leader gave them alcohol to drink and forced them to have sexual activity with him.

But the lawyer representing Daniel K. Newman told the jury the incidents never happened.

Attorney Thomas Willenborg said Newman's early accusers were angry with him about an incident unrelated to the accusations and wanted to hurt him. Other boys fabricated stories after hearing or reading about the initial accusations, he said.

Newman, 32, of 2218 Scott St., Covington, faces 10 felony counts of sexual crimes against four boys at Kincaid Lake — seven counts of sodomy, one count of sexual abuse and two counts

of complicity to commit sodomy.

As the trial began Monday, Pendleton County Commonwealth Attorney John M. Keith asked Circuit Judge Jack Arnold to dismiss five of 15 charges Newman had faced. Keith said during a recess that he had dropped the charges because they were not as strong as the other 10.

Newman's trial in Pendleton County Circuit Court will continue today. He is scheduled to stand trial Feb. 28 in Kenton County on 15 counts of sexual abuse and sodomy and March 20 in Campbell County on five counts of sexual abuse and sodomy.

In his opening statement Monday, Keith told the jury the case is about a cubmaster who

used his authority "to a horrible end."

Keith said he would introduce testimony and evidence to show that Newman fondled boys, forced boys to perform oral sex on him, forced boys to allow him to perform oral sex on them, forced boys to have sexual relations with each other and forced one boy to perform anal intercourse with him.

Willenborg said Newman's two sons will testify that the crimes could not have happened. They will say they would have seen them occur because they always slept with their father on camping trips.

They also will say Newman was fishing all night in a chair by Kincaid Lake on one night he is accused of having sexual relations with boys, Willenborg said.

Willenborg contends the first children interviewed by Covington police Sept. 22 lied because Newman had caught them smoking marijuana while they were supposed to be painting for him. Newman was arrested several days later.

After the story appeared in the press, Covington Police Sgt. Janet Radenheimer went from person to person soliciting information about possible abuse by Newman, Willenborg said.

Sgt. Radenheimer was the principal investigator on the case for Covington police. State police joined the case after boys told Sgt. Radenheimer they had been molested in a Ft. Thomas garage, Kincaid Lake and Newman's home.

Two boys, one 11 and the other 10, testified against Newman said he went to Kincaid Lake with Newman and a group of

boys after a soapbox derby at Northern Kentucky University last April.

When they were telling stories around a campfire that night, Newman "pointed to an ax. He said, 'I could chop you all up in pieces. It wouldn't bother me a bit.'"

During cross-examination, Willenborg sought to show the ax was only part of a session of ghost stories. However, the boy testified that when Newman told of how he could chop the boys up, "He said he could do it. Him. Not somebody else."

The boy, a Cub Scout in Newman's pack, testified that he drank wine cooler. He said Newman had beer, wine cooler and other alcoholic beverages on the trip.

"He poured it into a canteen. He didn't want his sons to know that I had it," the boy said. The boy also testified Newman had given him beer at Newman's home and had given him gum to chew so the boy's mother wouldn't smell the beer.

Keith asked the boy what happened as he lay next to Newman in a station wagon with other boys. The boy said Newman "stuck his hand down my pants and touched me in my privates, sir." He said he tried to pull away several times and was "sort of" able to do so.

Willenborg challenged the boy, asking why he waited until fall to tell anyone about the incident. The boy said he was afraid to tell anyone and afraid to quit the Cub pack because he believed Newman would harm him.

The 10-year-old told the jury he went twice with Newman and other boys to Kincaid Lake. He said he drank three beers Newman gave him on one of the trips.

The boy said Newman performed oral sex on him and on another boy.

Willenborg questioned the boy about which night he slept in a particular place. The boy had testified under direct examination that he had observed sex crimes on the second night of one trip. But on cross-examination he said he was sleeping in a tent, away from Newman, that night.

The boy said he didn't tell his mother about the incidents until the first accusations against Newman became public.

Cub Scout leader faces sex charges

Less than a month after Greater Cincinnati Boy Scouts executives began background screenings of new adult volunteers, a Covington Cub Scout leader has been arrested and charged in seven sex crimes against two boys.

Daniel Keith Newman, 32, of Scott Street, Covington, is in Kenton County Jail, charged with two counts of sodomy involving a 12-year-old Covington boy.

He also is charged with three counts of sodomy and one of sexual abuse in Campbell County and one

count of sodomy in Pendleton County, some involving a 14-year-old boy. Neither boy is a member of Cub Scout Pack 735, which Newman has led since September, 1987. Police do not know if the two were members in the past.

Newman has been removed as pack leader until the criminal charges are resolved, said Joe B. Quick, executive director of Dan Beard Council, the regional Boy Scout headquarters in Cincinnati. Pack 735 is sponsored by the Covington Lodge of the Fraternal Order of Police.

Newman was arrested Tuesday after Covington Police Sgt. Janet Radenheimer received a call from the mother of the 12-year-old boy.

Newman's arraignment on the two charges, which allegedly occurred in Kenton County, was continued until Wednesday so he can get an attorney. A preliminary hearing is scheduled Oct. 11.

As of Sept. 1, the Dan Beard Council requires prospective leaders to fill out more detailed applications, including character references and information on legal

troubles or substance abuse.

Applications are reviewed by committees of representatives from the individual units, heads of sponsoring agencies and staff at the council headquarters.

No FOP member had a role in selecting Newman as pack leader, said Covington FOP President Sgt. Donald Plageman.

"In the last 10 years, this is the second incident (involving allegations against an adult leader)," Quick said.

"But that doesn't mean it isn't serious. If there is even one, that's too many."

Scoutmaster accused of abusing boys

A Covington scoutmaster has been charged with molesting two boys and authorities say he may face additional charges involving other boys.

Daniel K. Newman, 32, of 2218 Scott St., faces seven sodomy and sexual abuse charges in Kenton, Campbell and Pendleton counties.

Covington Police Sgt. Janet Radenheimer, who is investigating the case, said Newman is accused of abusing two Covington boys, one 12 and one 14, who know Newman through Scout activities. The boys, however, are not members of Newman's pack, Cub Pack 735 in Covington.

Sgt. Radenheimer said additional charges may be filed in Kenton and Pendleton counties involving "several" other boys.

Sgt. Radenheimer began investigating the case Sept. 21 after the mother of the 12-year-old called police to report her son said he had been molested. The officer has been interviewing other children and she said the interviews will continue through next week.

The interviews involve children who are members of Newman's Cub Scout pack and other children who know Newman, but not through the Scouts, she said.

The cub pack is open to Covington boys in the first to fifth grades. It is sponsored by the Covington Fraternal Order of Police, which allows the pack to use its building in Covington.

Scouts to screen volunteers

In the face of growing concern about child protection, organizations such as the Boy Scouts of America are looking for new ways to screen volunteers effectively.

Newman is in the Kenton County Jail. He declined to comment this morning.

He pleaded innocent Wednesday in Kenton County District Court to two counts of first-degree sodomy involving the 12-year-old Covington boy.

According to a complaint signed by Sgt. Radenheimer, the 12-year-old boy told police that Newman molested him on June 30 and July 1 at Newman's residence. The boy told police New-

man threatened to harm him and his family if he reported the incidents to authorities.

Judge Steven Jaeger scheduled a preliminary hearing for Oct. 11.

Sgt. Radenheimer said Newman is charged in other counties because the incidents reportedly took place in those counties. She said she called in the state police to press those charges because they are outside her jurisdiction as a Covington police officer.

Newman faces three counts of second-degree sodomy and one count of first-degree sexual abuse in Campbell County; and one count of second-degree sodomy in Pendleton County.

Any major organization involved directly with children must "make an unusual effort to develop a systematic screen-

ing system," said Patricia Myers, a child abuse expert at Children's Hospital.

Most organizations are making every effort to do police checks, she said. But many child care agencies are having difficulty hiring workers or so- liciting volunteers because of low pay, long hours and the fear of being accused of sexual abuse, she said.

Big Brothers/Big Sisters in Cincinnati conducts police checks on all volunteers. The Dan Beard Council, which oversees about 32,000 scouts in Greater Cincinnati including more than 4,000 in Northern Kentucky, does not.

Kentucky State Police Detective Sandy Taylor said the Campbell County charges involve four incidents that occurred between March and late August.

The three counts of second-degree sodomy relate to incidents involving the 12-year-old Covington boy that occurred in a garage that Newman rented in Ft. Thomas, she said. She declined to give the specific address of the garage for fear of embarrassing the owner, who is not involved.

Sgt. Taylor said Newman used the garage to house a car, two boats and camping equipment.

She said the sexual abuse

charge in Campbell County related to an incident that happened with a 14-year-old Covington boy in the garage.

The second-degree sodomy charge in Pendleton County relates to an incident that happened with the 12-year-old Covington boy June 28 at Kincaid State Park near Falmouth, Detective Taylor said. She said the incident occurred during a scouting field trip.

Sgt. Radenheimer said some additional charges may be filed in connection with incidents that occurred during various field trips this summer to the Pendleton County park.

The number of Scouting leaders found guilty of child abuse is minuscule, he said.

In addition to the new screening process, the Dan Beard council has put into effect new rules designed to prevent one adult from being alone with children.

"There has to be at least two adults at all Scouting events. That is to protect the kids and the adults (against false charges of abuse)," Hopper said.

"What's difficult is that now we have to recruit two leaders now instead of one."
