## Murder defendant, attorney held in contempt for violating order

Circuit Judge Walter Kurtz held murder defendant Nealy Perry and attorney Robert Friedman in contempt of court yesterday for violating an order barring Perry from "any contact" with prosecution witnesses.

Kurtz chastised Friedman, who is from Memphis, for using Perry and two prosecution witnesses to set up a re-enactment of the February 1985 tavern shooting which led to Perry's conviction of first-degree murder and then, after a new trial had been granted, a conviction of the lesser offense of voluntary manslaughter.

But Kurtz placed Friedman on pre-trial diversion for six months — which means the contempt finding can later be expunged from his record.

Kurtz sentenced Perry, who formerly operated a service station on Murfreesboro Road, to five days in jail for criminal contempt of court.

Perry, 42, received an automatic life prison sentence when he was con-

victed of first-degree murder in February 1986.

But he was granted a new trial because of allegations of jury tampering, and he was released from prison last December — after spending almost two years behind bars — under \$35,000 bond.

Kurtz sentenced Perry on Nov. 10 to a 10-year prison term for voluntary manslaughter, but suspended the sentence and placed Perry on eight years' probation.

Kurtz charged both Perry and Friedman with contempt of court on Oct. 5 after Friedman introduced as evidence blowups of photographs showing Perry and Lonnie Phelps, a crucial prosecution witness, in the positions where Phelps said they were standing when Kenneth Paul Grissom was shot to death in the doorway of Melba's Hide-A-Way, at 431 Thompson Lane, on Feb. 1, 1985.

But Kurtz delayed a hearing on the contempt charges until yesterday.

Friedman testified yesterday that he was aware of Kurtz's order that

Perry have "no contact" with potential witnesses against him once he was released under bond last December.

Friedman said he advised Perry to avoid any contact with the witnesses in the case, but he said he instructed Perry to join him, Phelps and private investigator Ron Lax in re-enacting the shooting last June.

"We never thought about the applicability of the no-contact order," Friedman said.

And, Friedman testified, "I don't think Nealy said 12 words to anyone at the scene."

Attorney Lionel Barnett, who represented Friedman yesterday, said he will "definitely" appeal the contempt finding to the Tennessee Court of Criminal Appeals.

Barnett's law partner, Richard McGee, who represented Perry yesterday and aided Friedman in representing Perry during Perry's second trial last month, said he will probably appeal Kurtz's contempt finding against Perry. ■

## Photographer given 3 years' probation for sexually explicit tape of teen-ager

Free-lance photographer Everett Chapel received probation yesterday on charges of using a minor for obscene purposes in making a sexually explicit videotape with accused burglary ring leader Robert Brian Canter.

"I don't find that you're a criminal," retired Court of Criminal Appeals Judge William S. Russell said, as he placed Chapel on probation for three years and ordered him to undergo counseling and to perform 300 hours of public service work.

"I don't believe that you're going to take any more naked pictures of people, be they young, old or in-between," said Russell, who was hearing cases for his daughter, Criminal Court Judge Ann Lacy Johns, who recently bore her fourth child.

Chapel, 41, pleaded guilty to the charges — involving a 16-year-old boy — on Oct. 23.

Chapel, of 2003 Greenwood Ave., testified yesterday that Canter "informed me [last December] he had a young man that would like to get into modeling."

Chapel said he was surprised when the boy "disrobed" and began "playing with himself." But, Chapel said, he kept his video camera rolling.

Chapel said he took the tape home and never showed it to anyone, but police seized the tape last May as part of their investigation of Canter, a Madison karate instructor and reported devil worshiper who has been charged with using his teen-age students to commit burglaries and with sexually molesting some of the boys.

Chapel lost his job, as an engineering technician with the Metro Water

and Sewerage Services Department, as a result of the charges. He said yesterday he is still unemployed.

Dr. Gary K. Wilson, a psychologist who began treating Chapel last month, described Chapel yesterday as a "passive" person from a "very structured, religious environment" who is unlikely to commit any more crimes.

Wilson said Chapel needs to deal with "some hidden, latent homosexual tendencies inside of him."

Chapel's parents and leaders of the Madison Church of Christ, where Chapel is a member, appeared in court with him yesterday and joined in asking that he be placed on probation.

Russell said yesterday he saw no need to limit Chapel's participation as a volunteer leader with the Boy Scouts of America. ■
