Guilty plea entered in Boy Scout aduse case

lerry Lee Parrish will not be going to trial for the charges filed against him for taking indecent liberties with a child and for acts against nature. The ex-hov scout leader, residing at Route 1. Moncure, entered a guilty plea to four of the charges before Sup vior Court Judge Donald Stevens.

Parrisi pleaded guilly to four counts (! taking indecent libernes with a child. These four felonies combined could have carried a prison term of 40 years if he was convicted of the crimes by jury trial, seconding to North Carolina general stanits.

instead. Parrish pleaded guilty as part of a plea bargain, and the remaining charges were dropped. according to the district attorney's office. Sentencing will take place in November.

During the course of deliberation between defense attorney Phil Edwards and the district attorney the five crimes against nature charges and one charge of indecent liberties were dismissed and the four counts of indecent liberties with a child were consolidated, according to court records.

This superior court case, scheduled for 9:30 on September 11th, was referred to by Judge Donald Stevens as being of the most sensitive and serious" of cases.

Parrish was serving as a how Sout leader at the time of his arist. The two young victims were embers of the scout troop Parrish as involved with, according to errious statements by Charle of bunty sheriff detectives

During the course of events the

prosecution insisted on a guilty plea or a trial by jury. The pool of jurors were dismissed by the judge and Parrish and his attorney agreed to plead guilty to the four Class H felony charges. Judge Stevens replied. "With the interest of the young men in mind, this arrangement of a plea could be accepted."

Fox then proceeded with the state's evidence against Parr shanking each of the four counts separately. The two thirteen year old victims were under Parrish « leadership at the time of the incidents which mok place in Particle's home, said Fox,

Parrish stril resides near Pittsboro.

The sexual violations occurred independently and during episodes of "trust exercises" conducted by Parrish as he, explained Fox, would tell the boys he was going to hypnotize them or would have them fall into his arms,

Fox stressed that the plea arrangement "is acceptable to the parents and is in the best interest of the children." He said the interest of the children was a "paramount consideration of the state."

The state also asked that restitution be ordered for the "medical expenses incurred as a result of the experience." The requirement of the guilty plea in the criminal case to pay restitution for the medical and psychological expenses of the boys would allow a civil action against Parrish for damages, according to North Carolina state law.

As testimony ended Tuesday, Farren sought over the objections of Ellis to have Bain's opinions about the suitability and licensability of the Chatham/Wake site entered into the record. Long agreed to allow Bain to state his opinion for the record, but noted it would not enter into the decision's he makes.

"I'm to decide this week," the judge said, "if testing (characterization) is an adverse affect environmentally."

Bain said he did not think the Chatham/Wake site would meet state licensing requirements because of the geology of the site. "We have to isolate these (radioactive) materials 500 years," Bain said.

"At this site, because of its fractured (rock) nature and high water table, we would not be able to predict the rate of (water) movement or the direction. Therefore, we can't meet our responsibility to assure our descendants we can isolate it."

In response to further questioning, Bain said other areas in North Carolina were "better suited" for the low-level waste site. "There are potentially much better sites in North Carolina," he said.

Those sites include areas in the eastern coastal plain, the piedmont and the sandhills. Bain said a primary geological requirement for a site for a waste disposal facility would be one that was "flat . . . fairly uniform, with some degree of certainty that (the material) would be there for 500 years."

During his opening statement, Farren said he would be presenting evidence that showed the site along the Chatham/Wake border was included for consideration because of political reasons.

"We believe," he said, "it was not part of the original choice." Farren also said characterization was an intense process, going "far beyond the gentle probing" suggested by Authority and Chem-Nuclear attorneys. He argued that the digging, trenching, road building, and other activities would have severe effects on the site.

Ellis argued that Farren was attempting to interject parts of the case dismissed earlier. "The case," he said Monday, "is that characterization is so intrusive as to require an EIS, not the suitability of the site.

"We have to talk about the intrusiveness and where characterization will get them," Farren told the judge as testimony ended Tuesday.

"We won't get into all the hankypanky we allege . . . (but) we can't talk about this without talking about the potential ultimate suitability of the site."

Ellis countered that Farren "has taken the case far beyond what characterization will do to the environment,

"The issue," he said, "is what is going to happen as a result of characterization. He has taken it to his conclusion that the site is no good at all. The whole purpose of characterization is to see if it is suitable."

Ellis said that argument was "built on speculation."



FARRISH INCIDENT

BACKGROUND

I was District Executive of North Star District, Mecklenburg Co. Council from 1973 till May of 1975 when I moved over to Tuscarora District. Troop 57 was sponsored by First Union Presbyterian Church now Derita Presbyterian of which I was a member and at that time may have been Scouting Coordinator or on the committee. I recruited Jerry Parrish in the summer of 1973 to be on the District Committee as a resource person due to his extensive background in camping, hiking, climbing, etc. Over the next three years, he was also Roundtable Commissioner and finally a Unit Commissioner working with Troop 37. Then sometime in 1975 or 1975 he started working with Troop 67 as an Assistant Scoutmaster. In the early summer of 1975, Jimmie Stroupe the Scoutmaster asked him to leave the croop over a problem of Jerry seeming to think he was in charge of the troop.

THE INCIDENT

One evening in late August 1976, Mr. Stroube called me. The new District Executive had resigned and Doug Coffield, the Scout Executive and Bob Bartlett the field director where both out of town so he was calling me to help handle a situation that involved Jerry and a father who was coming to the troop meeting to 1.11 111.

I arrived at the swim club in Allen Hills to find a number of the parents gathered with Jimmy in the parking lot. The father had left the loaded shotoun in his car since Jimmy had located Jerry and Jerry decided to leave town. Jerry had been teaching some of the Scouts swimming ment badge at the pool.

It seems that Jerry had earlier in the day picked up the son of the man with the shotgun to work on some merit badge things. Since the mother had seen Jerry at some past meetings she assumed it was on. This happened a couple of times. When they returned, the mother noticed some oil in the boy's hair and she asked Jerry about it. He said the boy was just over heated. Later, the mother realized that it really was an oily substance and asked her son what happened. He made some racly to her. When the father came home from work she had him indutre of the boy. At that point, the boy told his father that Jerry had taken some nude photos of him, put the oil on him and touched him. I think I am right about what happened. The father became extremely angry and headed to the pool with the quit. Luchity. Jimmy was able to get Jerry to avoid the meeting. Jerry, we essume moved to Chapel Hill that evening.

mother mentioned that she had once caught Jerry in her living room touching her son in a way she didn't approve of. All of these incidents occurred in the summer of 1976. There may have been more but we don't know about them if there were.

Jerry told his family that he was run out of town for having an affair with Jimmy s wife . A story which Jerry's brother passed around when he became active in North Star District.

Later that evening I realized that Jerry also had a little prother in the Little prothers program. I called their executive director George something who I knew through the their executive immediately talked to the boy and was able to confirm that Jerry had done things with the boy also. They put a warrant out for his arrest. Whatever came of it I don't know.

As time passed, things Jerry had confided with us became clearer. For example, he was not allowed back on the property of Camp Sequoyan hear Asheville. In a conversation with another former counselor, they both said to me that they would be arrested if they went through the front gate. Jerry had also cold the and myself that he had been fired by a private ((think) and myself that he had been fired by a private ((think) school in Asheville as a teacher because of a misunderstanding involving a student. After the Troop incident, these scatements became a lot clearer. He also taught at Coulwood Junior High for one year and was released there but I don't know why.

FEFORTING THE INCIDENT

and I had lengthy conversations concerning the matter and Jimmy and Doug filed some forms and papers with the National Office, BSA in New Jersey that fall. We received a reply that we could not "black flag" Jerry's name at the registration office for reasons that I can t recall today. Jimmy, the parents and the troop committee where highly irritated but their wasn't much we could do except keep him out of any troops in the Charlotte area.

These boys are all in their 20's today. One of the other Scours who was later my assistant Scourmaster has talked to me about the incident but most have never—said anything. I den t think that at the time they realized what happened but probably do today especially with all the abuse publicity.

Scout master faces charges

PITTSBORO — A local Boy Scout troop leader was charged this week with taking indecent liberties with members of his troop, Chatham County Sheriff Don Whitt said Wednesday.

Jerry Lee Parrish, 43, of Route 1 Moncure, was charged Monday night with five counts of taking indecent liberties with a juvenile and four counts of crime against nature, he said.

"He was a scout master of a scout group in Pittsboro." Whitt said of Partish. Boy Scouting is for boys 11 through 17.

All charges filed against Parrish are class H felonies. The maximum penalty for each charge is 10 years in prison.

Chatham County sheriff's investigators arrested Parrish after finding photographs, negatives and him in his house, which is located off the Old Sanford Highway south of town, Whitt said.

"They searched the premises and found a few items that will be used as evidence," he said.

Chatham authorities began their investigation after receiving complaints from parents whose sons are members of the Boy Scout troop, Whitt said. After interviewing the boys, officers began gathering information needed for a warrant to search Parrish's house, he said.

One of the boys had been examined by a physician before sheriff's investigators began their investigation. Whitt said. He said he didn't know if the physician found evidence indicating that the boy had been sexually abused.

Chatham County sheriff's detectives plan to continue the investigation, Whitt said.

Parrish, a systems analysts at North Carolina State University in Raleigh, was originally placed under \$60,000 secured bond, Whitt said. His bond was reduced Tuesday to \$25,000 during his first court appearance.

Parrish is currently being held in the Chatham County jail in Pittsboro.

Mr. Parrish was charged Tuesday with five counts of indecent liberties and four counts of crimes against nature. He is being held without bail at the county jail in

Pittsboro in lieu of \$25,000 bond.

After the parents of the two boys complained to authorities, deputies obtained a search warrant of Mr. Parrish's home in Moncure.

"We seized a lot of film and negatives and some other pornography, I would cail it," Chatham County Sheriff Donald J. Whitt said

Mr. Hanchey said that Mr. Parrish registered as an assistant scoutmaster of the troop in 1983 and became the scoutmaster in 1985.

The following information is provided should you desire a review by the Southeast Region, BSA, of the decision to deny your registration.

- 1. Within 60 days, you must request in writing a review of this decision. Your request should be sent to the regional director, Southeast Region, BSA, P O Box 440728, Kennesaw, Georgia, 30144. In your request you may include your version of what occured in support of your claim that your registration should not have been denied.
- 2. Upon the receipt of your written request, a committee will be appointed to review the situation.
- 3. You may attend the review hearing, but it is not adversarial in nature and neither the committee nor you will be represented by legal counsel. If you wish, you may be accompanied by no more than two other individuals if their testimony might assist the committee in discovering the truth and arriving at a correct decision.
- 4. The committee will review the facts as presented, and may interview any persons-whose testimony might assist them in arriving at a correct decision.
- 5. You will receive a letter setting forth the decision of the committee.
- 6. If you disagree with the decision of the committee, you may request a review of this decision by the National Council of the Boy Scouts of America.
