Chief Grover D. Howell suspended Officer John Lavoie, a twenty eight year old police officer and a member of the East Hartford Police Department for three and one half years, with pay effective November 14, 1989. On Thursday November 16, 1989 at 2:00PM Officer Lavoie was ordered to report to the police department and attend a "pre-termination" hearing. This hearing was scheduled to allow Officer Lavoie the opportunity to state the reason or reasons why his employment with the East Hartford Police Department should not be concluded.

~~This pre-termination hearing was the result of Officer Lavoie having been charged by Chief Howell on October 6, 1989 with the following violations of the Rules and Regulation of the East Hartford Police Department.~~

Count One: Violation of Chapter V section 5.15 G. which states, in part, "Officers are prohibited from engaging in the following activities while on duty: any sexual conduct."

Count Two: Violation of Chapter V section 5.14 which states, "Officers shall remain alert, observant and occupied with police business during their tour of duty. When on duty, officers shall devote their entire time and attention to the business of the Department."

Count Three: Violation Chapter IV section 4.3 which states: "No officer shall engage in any personal conduct which, if brought to the attention of the public, could result in justified unfavorable criticism of that officer or the Department. No Officer shall be involved personally in disturbances or police incidents to his discredit."

The departmental charges were the result of an internal investigation ordered by Chief Of Police Grover D. Howell. The investigation was two pronged: first criminal and then administrative.

The criminal investigation revealed that Officer Lavoie, as senior advisor of the Explorer Post, engaged in sexual liaisons with an underage female member of the Explorer Post. The victim and her parents in this case did not want Officer Lavoie charged criminally in this matter. State's

Attorney John Bailey reviewed the facts of the case, which included a statement from the victim that she would not testify against Officer Lavoie. The State's Attorney's Office was willing to prosecute the case, however, based on the victims refusal to testify criminally and on the requests of the victims parents that Officer Lavoie not be criminally prosecuted, the State's Attorney decided that an arrest warrant would not be issued.

Thereafter, Chief Howell reviewed the facts and circumstances of the incident, discussed the case with the States's Attorney and decided that the case would proceed in an administrative manner.

The Department's Office Of Professional Standards found during the investigation that Officer Lavoie did in fact engage in sexual liaisons with the Police Explorer. Furthermore, it was determined and corroborated that Officer Lavoie, on one occasion, while in a marked police cruiser on duty and in his police uniform, engaged in sexual activity.

After having considered all the facts and evidence in the case, as well as all reasons presented by Officer Lavoie, his attorney and union representative, during the pre-termination hearing, Chief Howell has concluded that in the bests interests of the Town, Department, and the Explorer Post would not be served by continuing Officer Lavoie's employment with the department. Accordingly, he has notified Officer Lavoie that his employment has been terminated at 1:00PM on Friday, November 17, 1989.

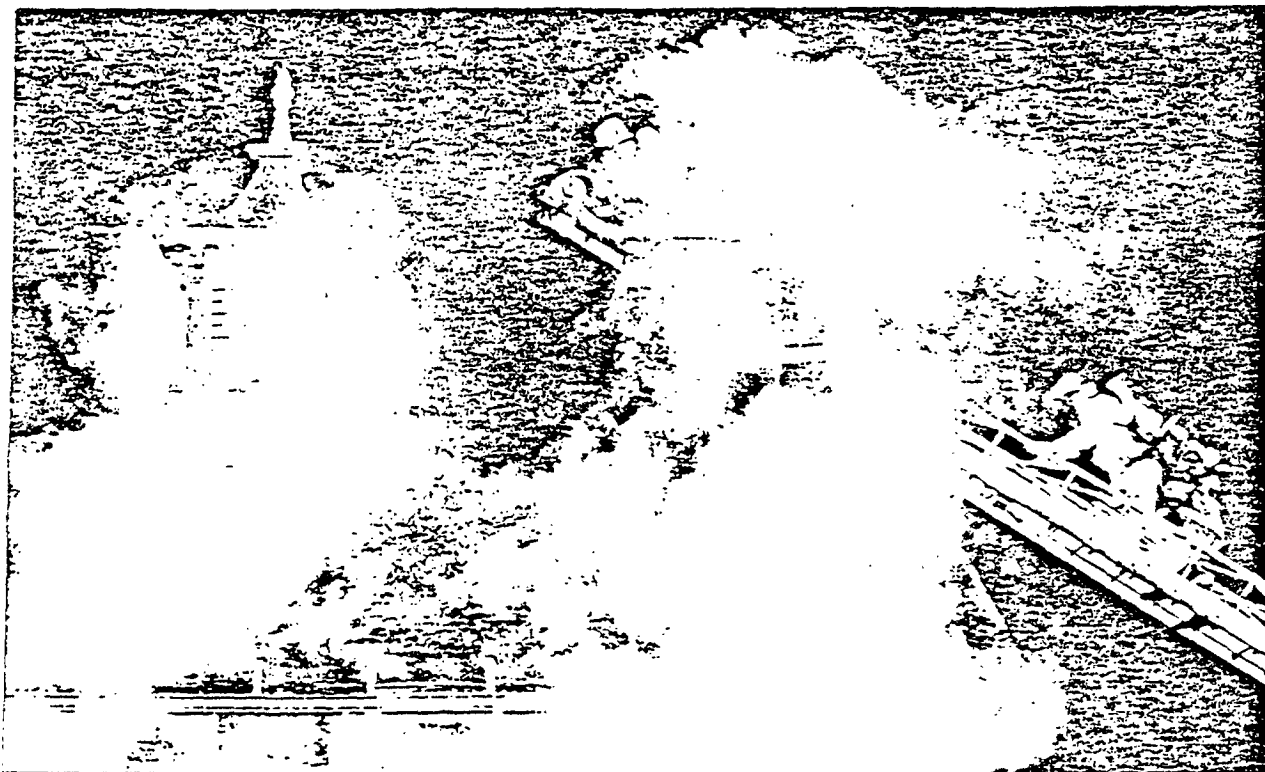

EAST HARTFORD — A town police officer who spent half his life pursuing a law-enforcement career was fired Friday for having sexual relations with a member of the department's Police Explorer post beginning when she was 15.

Police Chief Grover D. Howell on Friday fired John Lavoie, 28, after an exhaustive investigation resulted in Lavoie being charged in October with conduct unbecoming an officer.

The investigation, begun in September by the department's Office of Professional Standards, revealed that Lavoie and the girl had had numerous sexual contacts, including sexual intercourse, when the girl was 15 years old and which continued after she turned 16 in August.

Some of the incidents occurred in a police cruiser while Lavoie was in uniform and on duty, Howell said.

Department regulations state that officers "are prohibited from engaging in ... any sexual contact" while on duty.

"It's my first really serious case here," Howell, a 30-year-veteran of the New York City Police Department who has been police chief here for seven months, said Friday.

"Although the decision agonizes me, I feel it was the right decision," the chief said.

Despite Lavoie's previously unblemished career and his cooperation with the investigation, the chief said he had "no choice but to terminate with regret" when he weighed Lavoie's previous record "against the trust we placed in him as a role model."

Howell refused to comment on whether the girl is still a member of the Explorer post. He said that, to his knowledge, no other members have left the post because of the incidents.

Lavoie could have been charged with second-degree sexual assault and risk of injury to a minor because of the incidents, Howell said.

Although the state's attorney was willing to prosecute Lavoie, the girl's parents requested that he not be criminally charged and the girl said she would not testify against Lavoie.

Lavoie began his journey to becoming a police officer when he joined the Explorer post at age 14, Howell said.

Lavoie was an officer for more than three years and was senior advisor to the Explorer post. The Police Explorers are affiliated with the Boy Scouts of America and offer training for teenagers and young adults interested in law-enforcement careers.

Lavoie, whose police powers were suspended when the investigation began, had been working in an administrative capacity until last Tuesday, when he was suspended from the force with pay pending the outcome of a "pre-termination"

hearing on Thursday.

Lavoie's dismissal Friday is the most serious disciplinary action against a police officer since Joseph Triano was investigated six years ago on charges of using excessive force. Howell could not recall whether Triano was terminated at the time or resigned.

Lavoie's lawyer, Cheryl Hencko of New Britain, could not be reached Friday to comment on whether Lavoie will appeal his termination. Lavoie was reportedly out of town.

Michael Fowich, police union president, said in a prepared statement Friday, "Police officers are members of the human race. As such, we occasionally use poor judgment. John Lavoie used poor judgment and paid for it with the loss of his career. I know that this was not an easy decision for Chief Howell, and I will not comment on this decision."

Fowich said he felt the investigation was conducted properly and that "it worked to John's benefit."

The union head said he felt that Howell was trying to correct a lack of communication between ranking officers and patrol officers which, he said, clouded the department before Howell's arrival.

Fowich said he "doesn't recall a case of this magnitude before." He said Lavoie's fellow officers seem divided on his punishment.

"Some people think he deserved the discipline. Some people say he shouldn't have been fired," Fowich said.

Newly elected Republican Mayor Susan G. Krieger said in a statement Friday that "the behavior of the officer could not be condoned or tolerated within East Hartford. To assume any other position than that of Chief Howell would have reflected on the other fine officers of our police department."

According to a lengthy report of the investigation by Sgt. Mark Rinaldo and Officer Gary Willett, the Explorer was spoken to by Officer William Gillanders, an Explorer advisor and Lt. Albert Kerling, commanding officer of the Explorer post, about sexual advances she said Lavoie had made toward her last summer.

The officers spoke to Lavoie; the report states, but Lavoie continued to see the girl, and their contacts eventually evolved into a relationship.

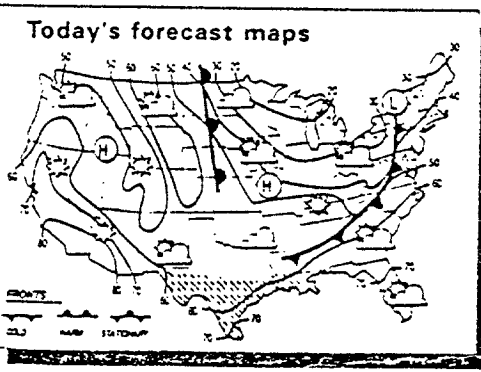
Howell said he was satisfied that Gillanders and Kerling didn't violate department rules in their handling of the situation, but he indicated he would rather have heard of the problem from the officers instead of anonymously.

"Maybe they didn't appreciate the seriousness of the situation," Howell said. "They didn't notify me."

Howell said the Explorer post now has three female advisors. Gillanders continues as an advisor. He praised the post and its award-winning activities.

Howell also commended Rinaldo and Willett for the investigation.

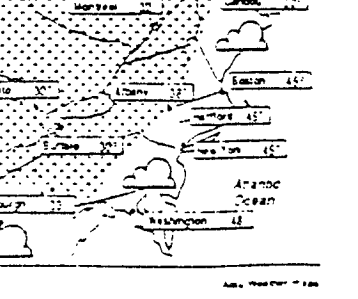

Police officer fired over sexual incident

LEBANON — A police officer was fired from his job after an alleged sexual incident with a 15-year-old girl. Officer John Layone, 28, was fired by police Chief Robert D. Howell Friday, but will not face criminal charges.

Layone, during only a two-month period, was charged with two violations of the department's regulations regarding sexual activity while on duty, not devoting his full attention while on duty, and conduct that could result in justified unfavorable criticism of the officer and the department.

At age 18, Layone became a member of the department's Police Explorer post and later became a police dispatcher. He has been an officer for 3½ years and served on the town emergency medical services commission.

Layone could not be reached for comment Friday. His lawyer, Cheryl Hitt, also could not be reached for comment to determine whether Layone will appeal Howell's decision.

Police union President Michael Fowich said, "Police officers are members of the human race and as such we occasionally use poor judgment. John Layone used some very poor judgment and paid for it with the loss of his career."

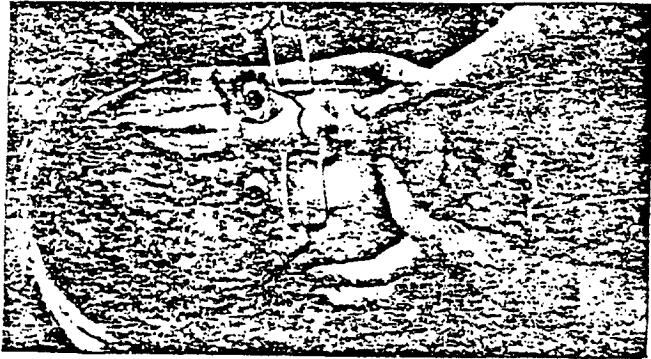
Fowich said the union believes the investigation was conducted properly and that officers are divided on Layone's firing.

"I've heard both ways. Some people think that he deserves the discipline that was handed out. Some people felt that it wasn't necessary to fire him," Fowich said.

Layone is the second officer to be fired from the department in recent years. In 1984, Joseph A. Tronano was fired after then Chief George F. Dayton determined that he had used excessive force in making a false arrest.

It was not clear whether there was enough evidence to try Adams for murder, but a key witness in the case is jailed in Kentucky and is fighting extradition to Connecticut. The case is scheduled to resume in January.
