

Dear Gene:

As we have discussed, there is a possibility we will have to deal at trial with allegations that Chris Blaine had homosexual tendencies while he served as scoutmaster of Troop 30. Although we will have more to say about this in our next report, we want you to know about a controversy in the Savannah area that could make any evidence of homosexuality particularly damaging.

We are enclosing an article that appeared in the June 5 edition of the Savannah Morning News. This article describes the indictment of the police chief of a suburb of Savannah. The police chief is accused of having molested three boys, under the age of fourteen, while they were boy scouts in a troop for which the police chief served as scoutmaster. The article says that one of the incidents occurred at Camp Strachan, which is a facility owned and operated by the Coastal Empire Council.

This is not the first newspaper article on the police chief, as he has been under investigation for several weeks. Although earlier articles made passing references to his involvement with the boy scouts, this is the first article in which specific allegations are made of a scout having been molested.

It is impossible to evaluate the effect this development could have on our case. We do, however, expect our case to go to

Chatham Indicts Ex-chief on Molestation Counts

The three separate indictments list three boxs each under age 14. Each victim reportedly was a Boy Scout at some time during his relationship with Sills. In each of the three cases, at least one of the incidents cited occurred at a Boy Scout facility in

Pooler or Chatham County

The local indictments charge Sills with:

• Two counts of child molestation involving a boy. One of the incidents allegedly occurred at Boy Scout Camp Strachan between June 1 and June 30, 1983, while the second occurred in May 1983 on Adams Hoad in Bloomingdale, the indictment charges.

• One count of child molestation and two counts of sadomy involving another boy in a camp trailer at the Pooler Boy Scout Building on Bourne Avenue. The child molestation allegedly occurred in October and the sodomy during February and on April 25.

• Two counts of child molestation involving a third boy. One of the acts allegedly occurred in the Pooler Roy Scout building on April 18. The other, involving the same victim, allegedly occurred at a place identified as "Devil's Woodyard," located in Chatham County pear Pooler, between Jan. 1 and March 31.

Sills. 43, was indicted on Monday by the Effingham County grand jury on six counts of child molestation and one count of uggravated sodomy against a minor in connection with incidents involving two boys, 10 and 12 years old.

Effingham County Superior Court Judge

Joseph Neville Tuesday set a \$15,000 bond for Sills, but ordered that he remain "locked up" at Georgia Regional Hospital, where he was volunturily admitted May 20.

Sills, police chief in the westside community for four years, was actively involved with the Boy Scouts. He was suspended as chief May 9 and resigned May 22

At Tuesday's bond hearing in Springfield, Sills' attorney, Michael Gardner, told Neville that Georgia Regional Hospital physician Dr. Charles Usher initially had refused to release Sills and described Sills as "suicidal" evenek Morning News 6/8/86

Sills worked as a security guard at Chatham City Apartments when former Bloomingdale police chief Mike Argust hired him in June 1976, Strozier said.

"It was one of these deals where you just don't check (the background of applicants) like you should." Strozier said.

After Sills began working in Bloomingdale "he immediately started undercutting Mike (Argust)," Strozier said. "He would tell me little things Mike was doing that he didn't particularly like. I just think when a man gives you a job, you ought to be loyal."

Pooler hired Sills about six years ago and made him chief two years

later.

City officials have refused to release Sills' resume, citing privacy laws. However, Pooler City Manager Dan Massey said it lists local employment since 1972. Sills is 43.

In the last six years, Sills ignited Pooler's enthusiasm and convinced people to donate time, money and talents to converting the old Starland Dairy property into one of the state's nicest Boy Scout facili-

He earned a reputation as a man who could turn wayward boys into responsible citizens, teach them skills and improve their grades and attendance at school.

"I don't know if he was trying to repent or what, but we know he helped out a lot of kids," one city official said. "Some of the things he did were really super."

Once named "Policeman of the Year" and "Citizen of the Year." Sills recently received a letter of commendation from President Reagan, praising him for his outstand-

ing work with the Scouts.

Shearhouse said the first complaint against Sills surfaced about a year ago when a distraught woman told him the chief had molested her nephew. Shearouse, who talked to the boy's parents, said the mother and father steadfastly maintained that the charges were ridiculous.

"I believed the parents because I had no facts," he said.

Six months later, Shearouse said, a 10-year-old boy ran up to Sills during a parade, "hugged him around the neck and kissed him."

After the two incidents, Shearouse said he became wary of "the way the boys would hang on him (Sills)" and the way the chief touched and treated the youngsters.

"Any time you're dealing with a man's life and charge him with something like this, you better have the facts," Shearouse said. "I had my suspicions, but just because some child gets up and makes an accusation, you don't want to throw darts at him. We were dealing with a man's life."

About a month ago, Shearouse said, a 15-year-old boy told him that the chief had molested one of the boy's friends. After the teen-ager convinced his friend to come forth, city officials talked to the boy and his parents.

The boy's mother told the officials that Sills gave her son expensive gifts and \$30 to \$40 in spending money, Shearouse said.

"It was a serious-enough accusation that you couldn't pass it off," said Councilman Jimmy Anderson, who oversees the police department. "Even if it wasn't true, it was serious enough that he had to be cleared. Not until the GBI got involved with it did I ever dream it would reach this magnitude."

Shearouse and Anderson called in the Georgia Bureau of Investigation the day after they spoke with the boy's family. Agents then talked with four families and told the city they had a definite case of child molestation on their hands.

"When you're dealing with a man of that high of a caliber, or who you thought was of that caliber, I don't know how to describe my reaction," Anderson said.

Last year, in an interview with the Savannah Morning News and Evening Press, Sills talked about his work with the Boy Scouts.

"One thing wrong with kids today is they lose respect for themselves," Sills had said. "My key role is to make them learn respect not only for themselves but for other people. Scouting teaches them to be a better citizen, a better person. I've seen it change a lot of the boys' lives. If a boy will stay with it six months, I can change him. I can change his attitude."

One Pooler resident who has known Sills for six years said the chief had an extraordinary fascination with guns and owned a veritable armory. He spoke often of his "kickass" fantasies and combat experiences in Vietnam, although Shearouse said Sills was only in the Marine Reserves and never saw active duty.

"He had a Rambo complex and liked to talk about guns and all those things that go along with the Rambo complex," the friend said. "Guns were an erogenous topic with him. If there was ever a clue, and I never had a clue, that was it."

Sills also formed a "commando" squad among Boy Scouts, who dressed in camouflage and carried toy rifles - an activity that kept at least one parent from allowing his son to join the Scouts.

"I didn't like the glorification of war," the parent said.

Sills also taught boys how to shoot weapons, including M-16 automatic rifles, on the firing range.

"He portrayed himself as a macho type person around women and children. He came out with that (tough talk) daily," Shearouse said.

About 11:39 a.m. on May 9 - the day the Pooler council suspended the chief pending the outcome of the investigation - GBI agents telephoned Sills from Shearouse's office and told him they needed to discuss an urgent matter with him. Sills said he had to take his truck in for repairs and would be back in 30 min-

utes, Shearouse said.
Sills never returned.

In a trailer he kept at the Boy Scout ranch, GBI agents found his police uniforms folded in perfect military precision. On his bed and table he had laid out his gun, belt, identification and the Marine Corps ring he had proudly worn.

Sales receipts for clothes purchased at Wai-Mart the day before were still in the trailer and the GBI concluded Sills had changed clothes and dropped out of sight.

Shearouse called an emergency council meeting at 2 p.m.

"The GBI continued to investigate and found more and more boys involved and more and more boys coming forth," the mayor said.

While Sills was still being sought, he sent his resignation to City Hall via his girlfriend. Since Sills had not been charged nor indicted, the city rejected it.

"I think he thought that we would accept the resignation, drop the charges and tell him to get out of town," Shearouse said.

When the GBI gathered enough evidence to seek indictments, the city sent word through Sills' girlfriend that if he didn't turn himself in, the GBI would pick him up. When Sills didn't come voluntarily, GBI agents found Sills in the first place they looked – his girlfriend's house.

When the GBI arrived, Sills said he wanted to confine himself voluntarily to Georgia Regional Hospital, a psychiatric facility. After Sills admitted himself, the city council reconsidered and accepted his resignation. Less than two weeks later, two grand juries handed down 14 indictments involving five children.

"I feel that there are more victims," Shearouse said. "Some parents did not allow us to talk to their children. We feel that there are others but we were refused consultation."

Not everyone in Pooler believed Sills was capable of molesting young boys. At first, residents turned out to support the chief. One group planned a parade in his honor until city officials talked them out of it.

"It's pathetic, it's tragic and it's terrible for the kids," one resident said. "The kids really worshiped

During last year's interview, Sills had said of the Boy Scouts, "This isn't something I could just quit and walk away from. I have all these kids to think about."

Now the kids are the only things Pooler parents are thinking about.



The Pooler Boy Scout Troop scoutmaster said he understood that the allegations involved Boy Seouts "to a certain degree.

"I am shocked," said Dave Schneider, the scoutmaster. Schnei-der said Sills, a coordinator of the 50-person troop, "volunteered a lot of his time and efforts." The Popler Police Department was the sponsoring organization for the troop.

Sills joined the Pooler depart ment in 1978 and was named police chief in May 1962. Sills was cited in 1978 as Police Officer of the Year by the West Chatham Exchange Club.

Sills worked as a security guard at Chatham City Apartments when former Bloomingdale police chief Mike Argust hired him in June 1976,

Strozier said. "It was one of these deals where you just don't check (the background of applicants) like you should." Strozier said.

After Sills began working in "he immediately started undercutting Mike (Argust)." Strozier said. "He would Bloomingdale tell me little things Mike was doing that he didn't particularly like. I just think when a man gives you a job, you ought to be loyal.

He earned a reputation as a man who could turn wayward boys into responsible citizens, teach them skills and improve their grades and attendance at school.

"I don't know if he was trying to repent or what, but we know he helped out a lot of kids." one city ofticial said. Some of the things he did were really super.

Once named "Policeman of the Year" and "Citizen of the Year. Sills recently received a letter of commendation from President Reagan, praising him for his outstanding work with the Scouts.

Shearhouse said the first complaint against Sills surfaced about a year ago when a distraught woman

told him the chief had molested her nephew. Shearouse, who talked to the boy's parents, said the mother and father steadfastly maintained that the charges were ridiculous.

"I believed the parents because I had no facts," he said.

Six months later. Shearouse said. a 10-year-old boy ran up to Sills during a parade. "hugged him around the neck and kissed him.

incidents. two Shearouse said he became wary of "the way the boys would hang on him (Sills)" and the way the chief touched and treated the youngsters.

"Any time you're dealing with a man's life and charge him with something like this, you better have the facts." Shearouse said. "I had my suspicions, but just because some child gets up and makes an accusation, you don't want to throw darts at him. We were dealing with a man's life."

About a month ago, Shearouse said, a 15-year-old boy told him that the chief had molested one of the boy's friends. After the teen-ager convinced his friend to come forth, city officials talked to the boy and his parents.

The boy's mother told the officials that Sills gave her son expensive gifts and \$30 to \$40 in spending money. Shearouse said.

"It was a serious-enough accusation that you couldn't pass it off, said Councilman Jimmy Anderson, who oversees the police department. "Even if it wasn't true, it was serious enough that he had to be cleared. Not until the GBI got involved with it did I ever dream it would reach this magnitude."

Shearouse and Anderson called in the Georgia Bureau of Investigation the day after they spoke with the boy's family. Agents then talked with four families and told the city they had a definite case of child molestation on their hands.

"When you're dealing with a man of that high of a caliber, or who you thought was of that caliber, I don't know how to describe my reaction.

Anderson said.

Last year, in an interview with the Savannah Morning News and Evening Press, Sills talked about his work with the Boy Scouts.

"One thing wrong with kids today is they lose respect for themselves, Sills had said. "My key role is to make them learn respect not only for themselves but for other people. Scouting teaches them to be a better citizen, a better person. I've seen it change a lot of the boys' lives. If a boy will stay with it six months. I can change him. I can change his at-

One Pooler resident who has titude. known Sills for six years said the chief had an extraordinary fascination with guns and owned a veritable armory. He spoke often of his "kickass" fantasies and combat experi-Vietnam. although Shearouse said Sills was only in the ences in Marine Reserves and never saw active duty.

"He had a Rambo complex and liked to talk about guns and all those things that go along with the Rambo complex," the friend said. "Guns were an erogenous topic with him. If there was ever a clue, and I never had a clue, that was it."

Sills also formed a "commando" squad among Boy Scouts, who dressed in camouflage and carried toy rifles - an activity that kept at least one parent from allowing his son to join the Scouts.

"I didn't like the giorification of war," the parent said.

Sills also taught boys how to shoot weapons, including M-16 automatic rifles, on the firing range.

"He portrayed himself as a macho type person around women and children. He came out with that (tough talk) daily," Shearouse said.

About 11:30 a.m. on May 9 - the day the Pooler council suspended the chief pending the outcome of the investigation - GBI agents telephoned Sills from Shearouse's office and told him they needed to discuss an urgent matter with him. Sills said he had to take his truck in for repairs and would be back in 30 min-

utes. Shearouse said. Sills never returned.

In a trailer he kept at the Boy Scout ranch, GBI agents found his police uniforms folded in perfect military precision. On his bed and table he had laid out his gun, belt. identification and the Marine Corps ring he had proudly worn.

Sales receipts for clothes purchased at Wal-Mart the day before were still in the trailer and the GBI concluded Sills had changed clothes and dropped out of sight.

Shearouse called an emergency council meeting at 2 p.m.

"The GBI continued to investigate and found more and more boys involved and more and more boys coming forth," the mayor said.

While Sills was still being sought, he sent his resignation to City Hall via his girifriend. Since Sills had not been charged nor indicted, the city rejected it.

"I think he thought that we would accept the resignation, drop the charges and tell him to get out of town," Shearouse said.

When the GBI gathered enough evidence to seek indictments, the city sent word through Sills' girlfriend that if he didn't turn himself in, the GBI would pick him up. When Sills didn't come voluntarily, GBI agents found Sills in the first place they looked - his girlfriend's house.

When the GBI arrived, Sills said he wanted to confine himself voluntarily to Georgia Regional Hospital, a psychiatric facility. After Sills admitted himself, the city council reconsidered and accepted his resignation. Less than two weeks later, two grand juries handed down 14 indictments involving five children.

"I feel that there are more victims." Shearouse said. "Some parents did not allow us to talk to their children. We feel that there are others but we were refused consulta-

Not everyone in Pooler believed Sills was capable of molesting young boys. At first, residents turned out to support the chief. One group planned a parade in his honor until city officials talked them out of it.

It's pathetic, it's tragic and it's terrible for the kids." one residen said. The kids really worshiped nım.

During last year interview, Sill had said of the Buy Scouts, "Th isn't something I could just quit ar walk away from. I have all the kids to think about."

Now the kids are the only thin Ower purents are thinking about.

Sills, 43, was indicted on Monday by the Effinghum County grand lury on six counts of child indicatation and one count of uggravated sodomy against a minor in connection with incidents involving two boys, 10 and 12

years old. Effingham County Superior Court Judge

Joseph Neville Tursday set a \$15,000 bond for Sills, but ordered that he remain "locked up" at Georgia Regional Hospital, where he was voluntarily admitted May 20

Sills, police chief in the westside community for four years, was actively involved with the Boy Scouts. He was suspended as chief May 9 and resigned May 22.

At Tuesday's band hearing in Springfield, Sills' attorney, Michael Gardner, told Neville that Georgia licgional Juspital physician Dr. Charles Usher mittally had refused to release Sills and described Sills as "suncidal."

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
