
You will recall that Pat Strine was placed on our red flag list about two years ago. He was district executive at Middletown, New York, about that time.

This satisfied the Scoutmaster and there was no problem as a result of it.

Dear Mr. Paulson,

Well, it was just about a year ago the we last met face to face in your office. I remember, during our conversation, that you offered your help in any way possble. I need that help now.

While I was still in college, I made ar acquaintance with a very wonderful family fron Cazerovia, New York. There are five children, including two teen-age boys. When I went to Newburgh, I lost track of them and did not see them for about 3 years. It is only in the past month that I re-acquainted myself and my wife with them. Since my wife and I have only been in Utica a short time, we have not made many close friends. This, I thought, was a beginning.

Last Friday, I received a registered letter from the father stating that he had recently attended a Scouters meeting (he is a Scoutmaster) and heard much to his shock, several things about me that upset him deeply. Naturally, he was quite concerned and he asked me to write to his san and sever all connections with him and the rest of his family by making up some excuse such as moving out west.

Of course, this upset me terrbly. I, more than anyone, realize that I made a grave mistake and have tried to correct it by taking treatment and abstaining myself from any connection with young people until I feel that I can cope with the situation. I feel that I is unnecessary for my name to be "circulated" all around Region 2 and every friend that I make (be it family or young people) may be here today...gone tomorrow. If I remember, the situation was to have been strictly confidential among the 4 principals involved. This family just happens to be involved in Spouding and it has no bearing on our relationship. In fact, Scouting was not even mentioned once during my visit. I made a point of it. I realize that Scouting must protect itself against persons such as me but....how far must the organization go to blackballime?

I do not blame anyone for this action. All I'm asking is a little cooperation from the National Council in preventing the further spreak of this type of thing. Of course, I realize that I must abide by the wishes of the organization for I am the one on the defensive.

As you see, I am connected with Radio W.A.L.Y. in Herkimer, N.Y. There has been evidence that this news also preceded me here, also. If this pattern continues, I will define tely lower my working standards and my goals, which I might add, I still have.

I would appreciate hearing from you concerning this matter. I am writing to you since, in the registered letter I received, The father was told to mention your name, and I would know what he was talking about. I realize that you are no longer obligated to assist me, but I don't know where else to turn.

He assigned one of his doctors to the case (Dr. Rico DeJesus) and Pat Strine has an appointment now for 10:00 A.M., April 14th, in the Social Service Building of the Middletown State Hospital.

I also called Pat Strine and told him about the doctor's appointment and he agreed to go through with the appointment and the treatment to follow.
