Four boys testify in area child sexual abuse case

BALLINGER — Four boys have testified this week in the trial of a former Runnels County ambulance service operator accused of molesting them.

Randy Nolte, 35, is charged with 15 counts involving child sexual abuse, including one count of aggravated sexual assault, said special prosecutor, Charlotte Harris.

Nolte operated the North Runnels County Emergency Service for six years before he was arrested in July of 1990. He is accused of sexually assaulting four Winters boys who were between 11 and 16 years old at the time.

The trial began Tuesday in Ballinger after a jury was selected late Monday evening, Harris said.

Harris was appointed special prosecutor in the case because Ken Slimp, Runnels County's assistant district attorney, had at one time represented the hospital served by Nolte's ambulance service, said 119th district attorney, Stephen Smith.

The trial will resume with more prosecution testimony at 9 a.m. today, Harris said.

Winters man not guilty on four counts

BALLINGER — The former operator of Winters ambulance service was found not guilty Thursday on four out of 16 counts accusing him of sexual assault and indecency with a child.

Judge John Sutton of the 119th District granted a request by defense attorney Stan Brown to find Randy Nolte not guilty on four counts of sexual assault of a child because of insufficient evidence.

Nolte, 35, continues to be tried today on eight counts of indecency with a child, three counts of sexual assault of a child and one aggravated sexual assault charge. He is facing a maximum of 5 to 99 years or life in prison.

Nolte is accused of having sexual conduct with four Winters boys ages 11 to 16 between 1985 and 1990.

Nolte was cleared on two counts because the victim's testimony contradicted the evidence stated in the indictment. The indictment states oral sex occurred. But the victim testified the act involved touching genitals.

He was cleared on two other counts involving the same youth because the allegations required corroborating evidence, which wasn't presented in the trial.

Nolte testified that he allowed boys visiting him to sleep in his water bed, but he never had sexual relations with them.

Nolte said he would help the boys with their homework or aid them in their Boy Scout merit badges for first aid and CPR.

The boys were involved in a weight training program at Nolte's house — also the North Runnels County Emergency Service office — including "hermia tests" that required examination of testicles, testimony showed.

After finding out about the charges, Nolte acknowledged that he asked his wife to remove some pictures of "horseplay" that might be misconstrued.

Among items found at Nolte's home after a July 1990 search was a package slip for an adult videotape and publication.

Psychologist testifies in trial of accused area child molester

BALLINGER — A psychologist took the stand to testify in defense of Randy Nolte Friday in the fourth day of his trial for allegedly sexually assaulting four Winters boys.

The boys, who range in age from 11 to 16, testified earlier this week about alleged incidents of sexual assault and indecency involving Nolte, the former operator of the North Runnels County Emergency Service. The incidents reportedly occurred between 1985 and 1990.

Nolte took the stand Thursday, testifying that he sometimes examined boys' testicles while conducting "hernia tests" during weight-training sessions at his home.

The suspect also said he often helped boys with homework and Boy Scout merit badges, gave them gifts for helping him with the ambulance service and allowed them to sleep in his water bed while visiting.

The Runnels County jury empaneled for Nolte's trial spent most of Friday afternoon outside the courtroom while 119th District Judge John Sutton considered whether to allow testimony presented by the defense's expert witness.

While the jury was out, Beaumont psychologist Curt Wills said that based on testing, he felt Nolte did not possess many of the

psychological characteristics exhibited by known child molesters. He conceded, however, that the test used is not always completely accurate.

Wills also criticized techniques for interviewing suspected child abuse victims, saying that children who can be manipulated by sex offenders may also be manipulated into making false accusations.

Special prosecutor Charlotte Harris objected to Wills' testimony, questioning its relevance and saying it would bias the jury.

Sutton ruled that Wills could testify before the jury about Nolte's test results, but could not compare the suspect to others who have been tested.

Sutton also said Wills could talk about interviewing techniques in general, but not about those used by caseworkers who interviewed the four Winters boys.

Nolte is charged with 12 counts involving child molestation, including one count of aggravated sexual assault of a child, a first-degree felony.

On Thursday, Sutton dismissed four other counts of sexual assault of a child because evidence presented by prosecutors didn't match details in the indictments against Nolte.

Defense attorney Stan Brown of Abilene is expected to present more witnesses when the trial

Verdict expected in Winters man's trial on assault charges

BALLINGER — A Runnels County jury is expected to decide today if a former Winters ambulance operator molested four boys.

Closing arguments are scheduled to begin about 9:30 a.m. in the trial of 35-year-old Randy Nolte who is accused of assaulting four boys, ages 11-16 at the time of the alleged attacks.

Nolte is accused of eight counts of indecency with a child, three counts of sexual assault of a child and one aggravated sexual assault charge.

If convicted of the aggravated assault charge he could face 5 to 99 years or life in prison.

Nolte operated the North Runnels County Emergency Service out of his home, until he was charged with the assaults.

On the trial's fifth day Monday, defense attorney Stan Brown presented witnesses who said they believed the four boys might be lying.

Two youths who spent time at Nolte's home — Kirk Conner, 16, and his brother, Allen Conner, 13, testified that Nolte never acted improperly toward them.

Kirk Conner said he slept in Nolte's king-size water bed once with Nolte, but no physical contact occurred.

Kirk Conner said investigators tried to prompt him into accusing Nolte by hinting that something might have happened with Allen Conner.

"It made me mad because they kept trying to goad me into saying something," Kirk Conner said.

On cross examination, Special Prosecutor Charlotte Harris pointed out that Nolte has been living with the Conner family for the past year.

The boy's father, Joe Conner, acknowledged on the stand that he was best man at Nolte's August 1990 wedding. And Conner's daughter, Mandy Conner, acknowledged on the stand that she is dating Nolte's stepson, Michael Rodriguez.

Evidence about one of the victim's past sexual behavior was examined in a closed courtroom and not allowed admission as evidence, by 119th District Judge John Sutton.

Sutton explained that the law says evidence about a victim's past sexual behavior must be examined "in camera." Sutton could have moved to an office to look at the evidence, but remained in the courtroom after spectators agreed to leave.

Winters man found guilty

BALLINGER — Former Winters ambulance service operator Randy Nolle was convicted Tuesday on 12 counts related to child molestation including one first-degree felony.

A Runnels County jury deliberated for about one and a half hours before finding Nolle guilty on eight counts of indecency with a child by sexual contact, three counts of sexual assault and one count of aggravated sexual assault of a child.

Nolle, 35, was accused of molesting four Winters boys between 1985 and 1990. The boys ranged from 11 to 16 years old and lived with Nolle or visited him regularly during that time.

The week-long trial will resume with punishment evidence at 9 a.m. today in Ballinger.

The aggravated account, which involves a boy younger than 14, carries a punishment range of five to 99 years or life in prison. The other 11 counts are second-degree felonies punishable by two-to-20-year sentences.

Four other counts were dismissed when the state rested its case last week because testimony did not match details in the indictments against Nolle.

The defendant operated the North Runnels County Emergency Service from his home until he was charged with the assaults in July 1990.

Four boys testified last week that Nolle fondled them and engaged them in other sexual activities.

Convicted child molester given an 80-year sentence in Ballinger

BALLINGER — Convicted child molester Randy Nolle was sentenced to 80 years in prison on a count of aggravated sexual assault Wednesday and 20 years in prison on 11 other charges.

Nolle operated the North Runnels County Emergency Service from his home until he was charged with molestation last year.

A Runnels County jury broke for dinner at 7 p.m. after deliberating for about five hours, then returned to decide on the sentence.

Nolle also was assessed a \$10,000 fine on each of the 12 counts.

Tuesday, Nolle was convicted on eight counts of indecency with a child by sexual contact, three counts of sexual assault and one count of aggravated sexual assault of a child.

All except the aggravated charge were second-degree felonies, punishable by two-to 20-year sentences. The aggravated count, which involved a boy younger than 14, carries a punishment range of five to 99 years in prison.

The 35-year-old defendant was accused of fondling four Winters boys and engaging them in other sexual activities between 1985 and 1990. The boys ranged from 11 to 16 years old and lived with Nolle or visited him regularly during that time.

Nolle said he sometimes allowed the boys to sleep in his water bed and often helped them with homework and Boy Scout projects. He also told the jury that he sometimes examined the boy testicles while conducting "hermia tests" during weight training sessions at his home.

During punishment-phase ar-

guments Wednesday, Brown sought probation for his client, while Harris suggested fines and a lengthy prison sentence.

Harris emphasized protecting other children and again alluded to a song one of the victims mentioned during testimony.

"Let's not leave the protection of our children to chance," Harris said. "Let's make sure they miss Mr. Nolle's 'Dance.'"

Winters man indicted on 11 counts

Randy Nolte, 34, of Winters, was indicted by a District Court Grand Jury on Thursday of last week on 11 counts including aggravated sexual assault of a minor, indecency with a minor and a number of counts of indecency by contact and sexual assault. The indictments related to charges filed after a complaint by an individual and Nolte's arrest on July 14 by Runnels County Sheriff's officers.

Arraignment in the case has been scheduled for September 13 in District Court.

Nolte has been free on bond since shortly after his arrest when bond was reduced from \$750,000 to a \$15,000 cash bond. He is the owner and operator of North Runnels Emergency Service in Winters.

Molestation charges filed

BALLINGER — Three charges of child molestation were filed Monday against Randy Nolte, 34, of Winters, operator of the North Runnels Emergency Service.

Nolte was charged with two counts of sexual assault on a child under 17 and one case of indecency with a child under 17.

Bond was set at \$250,000 on each charge by Precinct 1 Justice of the Peace Wilburn Davis. Nolte is being held in the Runnels County Jail in Ballinger in lieu of the \$750,000 bond. His attorney has requested a bond reduction hearing.

Runnels County Sheriff Bill Baird said Nolte was arrested about 9:30 p.m. Saturday near Wingate, after a warrant was issued by 119th District Judge John Sutton.

Baird said he had been working on the case about a week. The three charges, and perhaps others, will be presented to the grand jury in the next few days, he said.
