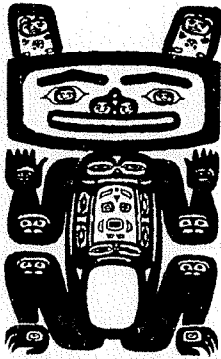

Big Morals Investigation In Juneau, Anchorage; Police Interrogate Forty

JUNEAU (A.P.) — Juneau Police Chief Pat Wellington said today his staff and State Police are completing a five-week morals investigation in which some 40 persons have been questioned here and in Anchorage.

Capt. William Trafton, state police commander for S.E. Alaska, said a "half dozen" state employees have been interrogated during the investigation.

Trafton said Wellington has questioned "at least one" state employe in Anchorage.

The investigation dealt with reports of homosexual activities.

Under an agreement between Juneau police and State Police, Wellington's staff interrogated only those not connected with state government, with the exception of the questioning done by Wellington in Anchorage, Trafton said.

Gov. William A. Egan was highly critical of a report that most of those persons questioned during the course of the investigation were state employes.

"Actually," the governor said, "only a very small percentage of the persons questioned had any connections with state government."

Juneau Men GUILTY Sentencing Dec. 2nd

JUNEAU (A.P.) — Two Juneau men charged with contributing to the delinquency of a minor as the outcome of a five-week morals investigation pleaded guilty before Superior Court Judge James A. von der Heydt Tuesday.

Judge von der Heydt set sentencing for Allen L. Harran, 29, a businessman, and Richard B. Kirkpatrick, 31, a pharmacist, for Dec. 2 after ordering probationary reports on both men.

Harran and Kirkpatrick, both free on bail, were charged with one count of contributing each.

Appearing before Judge von der Heydt one after the other, Kirkpatrick and then Harran waived grand jury action and asked that a guilty plea be entered.

Morals Probe Completed, Chief Reveals

JUNEAU (A.P.) — The arrest of two Juneau men, one a pharmacist and the other a businessman, completes a five-week morals investigation here and in Anchorage, Police Chief Pat Wellington said Friday.

Allen H. Harran, 29, a partner in a Juneau retail store, was arrested Thursday on four counts of contributing to the delinquency of a minor.

The complaint was subsequently amended Friday to one count of contributing. Harran was freed on \$10,000 bond awaiting arraignment.

The pharmacist, Richard B. Kirkpatrick, 31, was arrested Friday on one count of contributing to the delinquency of a minor.

Deputy Magistrate Crosby continued 2 1/2 days Kirkpatrick, after he appeared before Crosby counsel Monday, after Kirkpatrick was jailed \$2,500 bond.

Wellington said the probable crime charges would be filed as a result of the investigation which resulted in the questioning of some 40 persons. The five-week investigation was targeted out by Juneau and Anchorage police and federal authorities. Capt. William Trafton, southeast commander of state police, said the investigation resulted in the questioning of a half dozen state employes. He declined to give a specific figure.

Alaska police carried on most of the questioning here and willing on said he had personally interrogated some 10 persons in Anchorage. A connection will be made between the two men.

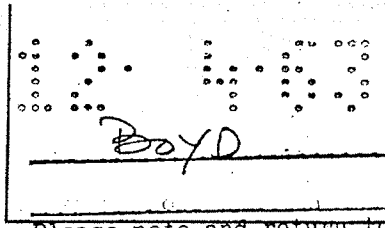

Purpose of Visit: Work with Executive, Erich Naethe, in Juneau and District Executive, Will Gilinsky in Ketchikan, attend Executive Board in Petersburg. Assisted in Man power recruitment, checked on council quota, membership, finance, Jamboree, and nominating committee.

Conditions Found: Alaska ferry system has assisted transportation problem and improved the economy through increased tourist trade. This has resulted in an inflated economy. Finance support is approximately the same as last year with some slight improvement resulting in need for very austere budget. Membership down 14.2% over year ago. BOYS' LIFE 58.9%.

Action Taken: Reviewed with Executive condition of council and assisted in clearing office after three weeks in field on finance. Gave suggestions for improved management. January and half of February were the only months this council had secretarial help. Assisted executive with finance report and helped bring finance report up to date.

Council owes \$1,000 each to Curt Shattuck and Dr. Rude. They expect to pay \$500 each from this year's funds. \$2,500 owed First National Bank. The bank is retiring this loan by write off at \$500 per year. Council pays interest. This council will be reduced to \$2,000 December 31. \$6,000 borrowed from Capitol has been reduced to \$4,500. \$4,000 real estate loan in Ketchikan is being reduced by rent payment. Extreme cold caused pipes to burst. Weather 6" above. George Parks gave \$500 he would spend attending National Council Meeting in May to pay staff salaries.

Assisted executive with morals case and talked with district attorney. Person involved is Order of Arrow advisor. Executive will provide details to registration letter. See attached clipping.

National guard has been very helpful to council by keeping their equipment in mechanical order. Chaplain Walter Soboloff assists in contacts with towns and villages of southeast Alaska. General Tom Carroll agreed to serve on Executive Board.

Met with Chief Harris of Coast Guard and executive to consider possibility of council approval for gift of 32 foot sailboat from private individual to Sea Scouts.

Met with President Tom Brown, Past President Paul Palmer, Erich Naethe to prepare board agenda, promote Key Three, follow-up on finance and membership. Contacted council finance chairman, John Stimpson. Met with Explorer Committee in planning for delegate conference to be held at Sitka in December.

Traveled to Ketchikan to work with Will Gilinski and assist in recruitment, district organization, manpower management and personal advice. Met with Bill Mitchell, District Chairman.

Travelled to Petersburg on ferry to attend joint council board meeting with representatives from Juneau and Ketchikan attending. Ferry travel has made possible closer unity of the council.

At board meeting, Norman Heimdahl was presented the Silver Beaver. Lethin was given an opportunity to review district and unit analysis. The finance committee and president agreed to study operation so that clerical help might be provided in the council office at least three days a week. Council and executives feel they can attain a membership of 1200 for year end. Key Three plans to attend January 11 in Portland.

2. Closer attention to finance reporting and board minutes.
3. Watch Gilinsky and encourage. Three months without pay strains dedication.
