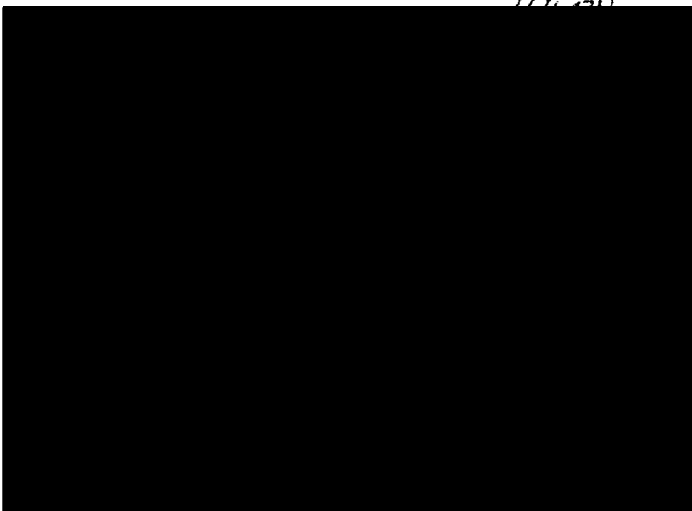




Dear Mr. Dolan:

I am in receipt of your letter of January 11, 1989. It is also my understanding that the Boy Scouts have scheduled a meeting for Wednesday, February 15, 1989 to deal with Mr. Jonasson's status.

At this time, Mr. Jonasson will not be attending that hearing panel. Mr. Jonasson has made the decision to not pursue matters further with the Boy Scouts at this time for two reasons. First, he continues to question whether the procedures in place will result in a fair disposition of issues pertaining to his registration. Second, for personal reasons, he does not have the time available to him to adequately prepare for a hearing at this time.

You have probably already received the attached procedure but we are sending a copy as a convenience to you.

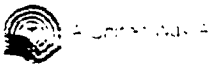


Enclosed please find a letter I have sent to Brian Linn explaining that these are the new procedures, and responding to each of the numbered concerns he raised in his letter.

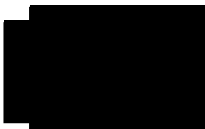

Dear Mr. Linn:

Enclosed please find a copy of the procedures which will be used for the hearing involving Mr. Jonasson. These procedures will be given to the hearing panel as well as to you (and through you) Mr. Jonasson. They seek to use simple language to explain the way in which the hearing will be conducted.

In your letter dated November 16 you made a number of suggestions relevant to the way in which we conduct these particular proceedings. I will respond briefly to each one.

As to No. 1, the review committee will be selected among individuals who have no prior knowledge of Mr. Jonnason or the facts pertaining to the matter. The procedures are quite explicit on this. Indeed, we request anyone who, subsequent to appointment, finds that they have knowledge of these matters to voluntarily remove himself from the committee.

As to No. 2, in the main, that suggestion is adopted except where we believe issues of confidentiality relating to a complainant are involved.

As to No. 3, legal counsel for the Boy Scouts will not be present during the proceedings, although can explain to the committee the way in which the proceedings are to take place, responding to any questions they might have outside of these particular procedures.

As to No. 4, the burden of proof originally was that a person who wishes to apply for a position as a leader or retain one's position as a leader had to prove beyond a reasonable doubt that they were fit in all regards for that position. This burden of proof has been reduced from beyond a reasonable doubt to presenting clear and convincing evidence to that effect.

As to No. 5, legal counsel for neither the Boy Scouts nor the applicant will be allowed at the hearing. However, as with legal counsel for the Boy Scouts, you are free to meet with your client at any time before the hearing in order to assist him in his preparation.

As to paragraph No. 6, statements and witnesses will be allowed by Mr. Jonasson subject to the usual considerations of cumulativeness.

As to No. 7, neither side will be permitted to make a recording of the proceeding.

We wish to point out that some of the safeguards you suggested in your letter of November 16 were already in place. However, we are pleased to confirm them in the enclosed document.

Should you have any questions about this document, please feel free to be in touch with me. In any case we will, as you request, schedule a meeting at which these proceedings might go forward.

We recognize that not all of the procedures enclosed in the attached document will be to your complete satisfaction. We have endeavored at great length and substantial cost to come up with a process which is fair to applicants as well as ensures that we are able to meet our fiduciary responsibilities with reference to the young people entrusted to us.

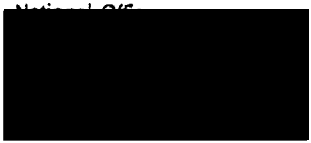

[REDACTED] called to discuss Richard Jonason and share some information. She told me the following:
That Mr. Jonason had found a new job and was moving out of the city. He had been employed at Ballard Hospital and ~~was~~ became unemployed when the hospital removed its steam heating plant.

That Mr. Jonason was selling his home where he and his mother lived - and was also selling his "Scout house."

That she would be meeting with him soon to return the Scouting equipment and uniforms that were borrowed from him.

That Mr. Jonason had told her that he had known Judge Gary Little and that she had known someone who had been abused by Judge Little.

[REDACTED] wanted to discuss Mr. Jonason with me and I explained that I ^{have} intentionally distanced myself from that situation because my ~~job~~ ^{role} as DE is to insure that the boys ~~are~~ have a quality scouting program in the future. I stated

that the Jonason situation and the program situation a separate issues and that I would not speculate on the former. She asked if litigation was underway. I said I did not know. She said that ^{she thought} the whole affair had left everyone confused and that she did not think it was handled well by the council. I said that the council's pledge was to maintain confidentiality and that the council has done that to protect everyone ~~is~~ involved. I said that any information she had on the situation had come from sources other than ~~than~~ the council. I agreed with her that this ~~is~~ has been very confusing ^{and} ~~and~~ that time will show what has been handled well and what has not, but in the meantime we should work to maintain a good program for the boys. I told her that I would be working to help the troop and that she would hear from me in January ~~and~~ ~~the holidays~~.



Dear Mr. Dolan:

I have not been back in touch with you recently, because my client and I have been doing some investigation and research. We are now in a position to respond more fully to your correspondence of September 20, 1988 which outlines your proposed process for resolving this matter.

At the outset, you should be aware that Mr. Jonasson does indeed understand that the Chief Seattle Council is placed in a delicate and difficult position when any charges of sexual impropriety are made against any scout leader. He expects those charges to be taken seriously, to be thoroughly investigated, and to be resolved in a manner that is fair to all concerned.

He and I believe that your proposal for a method of proceeding misses the mark. You begin with the assumption that you do not have the resources to adjudicate truth and then you develop a one-sided, biased process wherein a man who is presumed to be innocent under every legal notion fundamental to our society loses the presumption of innocence. You then set in motion a process wherein you virtually guarantee, by reason of the way the process is defined, that the individual will be found to be guilty.

You place upon Mr. Jonasson "the burden of proving beyond a reasonable doubt" that he meets all of the qualifications of the Boy Scouts and that he has done nothing wrong. You state that if there is "even a credible doubt" that he will not be permitted to be a scout leader. Yet you do not even afford him the opportunity to know who his accuser is, whether there is any corroboration, what the specific nature of the accusation is, or provide him with sufficient information against so he can defend himself. You further deny him the right to confront and cross examine evidence and you suggest that he be tried in secrecy in a manner which is more akin to mid-evil England or certain Communist countries than to the United States.

We are especially offended by your reference to the Judge Little matter on page 3 of your September 20, 1988 correspondence. We cannot condone community panic and overreaction and, more importantly, reference to the Judge Little matter is wholly and completely irrelevant, in that Judge Little has absolutely no connection with or anything to do with Mr. Jonasson. The inference is that, somehow, because a Superior Court Judge molested children that Mr. Jonasson molested children.

We are further taken aback by your defense of your client's position when you state that the Chief Seattle Council has "taken all reasonable steps to ensure that Mr. Jonasson had an opportunity to gracefully withdraw from the Boy Scouts without the slightest hint of impropriety." This is another statement to the effect that Mr. Jonasson has been tried and convicted and that you are somehow doing him a "favor" by letting him "gracefully withdraw."

Instead, we view this as an abdication on the part of the Boy Scouts of its responsibilities to the scouts which it serves. If indeed it is correct that Mr. Jonasson molested children, then the Boy Scouts has the responsibility to proceed to protect other children from future harm.

Mr. Jonasson's concerns begin with his concerns for himself; however, his concerns are much greater. After more than four decades of involvement with the Boy Scout movement, Mr. Jonasson, like many of your volunteers, has made a lifetime commitment to the Boy Scouts and what it stands for. This is a deep personal and religious commitment which comes from the very depths of Mr. Jonasson's soul. He believes that if he were not to aggressively stand up for his rights against the unfair process that has been developed, it is Scouting that would lose, as well as all of the other volunteers who could also be falsely accused at any point in time and then excluded from scouting by way of an unfair process.

You have requested that we set forth in writing our proposal for a more fair process, and we are willing to do so with the hopes that by negotiating an appropriate process, we can avoid protracted debate and litigation. Our proposals are as follows:

1. The Review Committee should be selected among individuals who have absolutely no prior knowledge of Mr. Jonasson, anyone who has filed a complaint against Mr. Jonasson or any of the facts pertaining to this matter.

2. The Review Committee should receive no information of any nature or kind whatsoever which is not also simultaneously provided to Mr. Jonasson.

3. There should be no communications between legal counsel for the Boy Scouts unless legal counsel for Mr. Jonasson is also present or his presence has been waived by Mr. Jonasson.

4. The burden of proof should rest with the Counsel to demonstrate, by a preponderance of the evidence, that Mr. Jonasson has indeed committed the act of sexual molestation that he has been charged with.

5. Mr. Jonasson should be entitled to have legal counsel or another representative of his choice present at the time of the hearing.

6. Mr. Jonasson should be entitled to present any witnesses on his behalf and written statements by those who know him and support him.

7. Mr. Jonasson should be permitted to make a tape recording of the proceeding. In the alternative, the Council should be required to record the proceeding and provide Mr. Jonasson with a copy of the transcript.

It is Mr. Jonasson's desire to proceed forthwith to appear before the Review Committee if the proposals set forth hereinabove can be incorporated into the process. Mr. Jonasson informs me that many of the Scouts and their parents are as anxious as he is to reach resolution of this matter by restoring Mr. Jonasson to his position of leadership with the Boy Scouts.

While we appreciate your articulated desire to maintain confidentiality in this process, we do believe that your priorities are misplaced and your judgment misguided. We agree with you that it would be libelous and/or defamatory for anyone to make statements to the effect that Mr. Jonasson had maintained any form of sexual relationship with any child at any time, because any such statement would be categorically untrue.

Mr. Jonasson believes that loyalty must remain at the heart of the scouting movement. It is an integral part of the Scout Oath and Scout Laws. Loyalty requires that the Scout Council maintain a process that is fair to its volunteers.



It is an easy matter to accuse a person of child molestation. It is also an easy matter to brand a person behind closed doors as a child molestor.

It is not always an easy matter to be judicious and fair. It does require resources, time, energy and commitment to determine truth. All that Mr. Jonasson is seeking is sufficient loyalty on the part of the Boy Scouts to put in place a fair process which is designed to discover the truth.

SUMMARY RULES OF PROCEDURE FOR CHIEF SEATTLE
LOCAL COUNCIL COMMITTEE REVIEWING DECISIONS
TO DENY OR SUSPEND LEADER REGISTRATION

Introduction

The following procedures are intended to supplement the Procedures for Reviewing Denial [or Suspending] of Member Registration contained in Appendix E of the national BSA pamphlet entitled "Child Sexual Abuse: How to Deal with It" (No. 34-99 1988 Revision). A copy of National procedures is attached hereto.

The Boy Scouts is a wholly private organization and can set any reasonable standards it wishes with reference to qualifying to be a youth leader. The Boy Scouts require that people wishing to serve as leaders must themselves prove that they meet all those guidelines as well as effectively refute any credible evidence which raises a doubt as to their qualifications to serve.

It is important to keep this in mind as you conduct your review hearing. This is not a court of law; there are no presumptions in favor of the Applicant. The Boy Scouts of America has a strong moral, social and legal obligation to present the safest possible environment to the young people who come trustingly into our organization and are authorized to do so by their parents and guardians. It is to them that we have our primary obligation; not to those who serve as leaders.

However, we must be mindful of the distress that having one's registration denied or suspended can cause to an Applicant. In all cases, the Applicant should be dealt with civilly and courteously. This is especially true given the fact that we do not condition the denial or suspension of registration on proving the underlying charges.

Nonetheless, the Boy Scouts would be in grave danger as an organization for both legal and public relations reasons if it were less than vigilant in ensuring that its leaders are fit to serve beyond a reasonable doubt. All doubts must be resolved in favor of the safety and security of the children who come into this organization.

I. Preliminaries.

1. The committee should identify itself as a review committee appointed by the President of the Local Council. It is appropriate for each of the members of the committee to identify themselves by name. No other personal information need be divulged.

2. If upon meeting the Applicant, it becomes clear to a member of the committee that he or she has some knowledge of the Applicant outside of the paper record, that person should voluntarily step off of the committee and be replaced by an alternate. Similarly, if the Applicant should object to any of the members of the committee on any reasonable grounds whatsoever, that person or persons should step down. If there are insufficient alternates available for the committee's effort to go forward that day, then the matter should be postponed until replacements can be appointed. Objections like all the committee members were appointed by the Local Council President and therefore are biased are not acceptable grounds.

3. It should be emphasized to the Applicant that the standard is whether, after reviewing all the evidence, there is clear and convincing evidence that the Applicant "possesses the moral, educational, and emotional qualities" necessary to afford positive leadership to youth. You should impress upon the Applicant that a person's registration must be denied or suspended if there is credible doubt as to that; even if the committee does not believe that a person, in fact, lacks those qualities. Therefore, the Applicant should be informed that a denial or suspension of that person's registration does not indicate a belief within the Boy Scouts of America that a person is in fact inadequate in one's moral and other relevant qualities.

4. The committee should summarize the nature of the charges relating to the Applicant with sufficient detail so that he can be apprised of what is being alleged, but without violating the confidentiality of complainants or other sources of information.

5. The Applicant should be advised that these proceedings are ~~completely~~ confidential and that nothing beyond the result will be divulged to anyone outside of the top Council leadership.

6. The Applicant should be reminded that there is an appeal from this committee's decision in the event that he or she does not accept the result.

II. Hearing Procedures.

1. The person appealing the denial or suspension of registration should always be referred to in the third person as the Applicant. When addressing the Applicant, the person should be addressed as Mr., Ms. or Mrs., as that person prefers.

2. Neither the Scout Executive nor the Applicant should be allowed to bring to the hearing a lawyer, personal representative or someone to witness the proceedings for them.

Neither side will be permitted to tape record the meeting or use a court reporter/stenographer. There will be times in which an interpreter might become necessary.

3. The Applicant need not be allowed to be present during testimony where there is a substantial confidentiality issue. If the Applicant is not present during some testimony, the gist of that testimony should be summarized to the Applicant. The Scout Executive, as a general rule, will be allowed to remain during the entire proceeding.

4. If any members of the committee have personal information about this matter they should not be sitting as committee members. Only facts which are brought out at the hearing or are in the paper record should be relied upon in forming a decision.

5. At the commencement of the hearing, the committee should designate one member as a secretary who will keep a summary of the proceedings. Each of the members of the committee can make their own notes about the proceedings. However, at the end of the hearing, all members must surrender all of their notes or copies of evidence to the Scout Executive for disposition. This is absolutely essential so that the confidentiality of the proceeding is not accidentally compromised.

6. The tone of the hearing should be civil and courteous toward the Applicant. Maintaining an appropriate businesslike demeanor assists the Applicant understand the seriousness and the uncertainty of the outcome of the proceedings.

7. Reliable persons with secondhand information may be allowed to speak, but the committee should weigh that testimony accordingly. Written statements may be allowed. Judicial rules of evidence do not apply; evidence is acceptable if it possesses the probative value commonly accepted by reasonably prudent people in the conduct of their affairs.

8. Persons wishing to speak will not be sworn in this proceeding but the committee does have two obligations here. First, in speaking with the person before testifying, they should ascertain the person's ability to understand the obligation to speak the truth. This is particularly important with very young people. Secondly, they should admonish the person in a businesslike fashion of their obligation to tell the truth, emphasizing the importance of these proceedings.

9. The committee has the right to be in control of the way in which the hearing proceeds including the length of testimony and questioning. This does not mean that you should be impatient with people who obviously have no experience in participating in such proceedings.

10. It is important that the Applicant has a fair opportunity to present his side of the story. However, the committee does not have to allow unduly repetitious testimony, and so on may be allowed.

11. The committee has the right to decide in what order the testimony will come forward. This may involve having the hearing adjourned from time to time so that witnesses can be scheduled in such a way so that they will not meet each other outside of the hearing.

12. The committee can grant postponements at the request either of the Scout Executive or the Applicant should that be regarded in a furtherance of a fair and accurate hearing. Of course, the denial of the Applicant's registration will remain in force throughout the course of the proceedings.

13. At the close of all testimony, the Applicant should be allowed to make a closing statement. The Scout Executive, if he feels it is necessary, may reply. As a general rule, the committee should strive to allow the Applicant to have the last word.

14. After the hearing is adjourned, the committee should decide whether it wishes to consider the information then or continue to another time at which they can have a more leisurely evaluation of the information presented.

15. At the meeting to evaluate the evidence, the discussion should be relaxed and informal with everyone sharing their views in order. The decision of the committee will be reached by majority vote. The chairman of the committee will prepare the decision unless he is in the minority, in which case one of the other committee members will prepare the decision. It should be brief and to the point. It should then be presented to the Scout Executive.

She was concerned because her son did not want to be scouting with anyone else other than Mr. Jonasson.

During our conversation she indicated that in a conversation with Mr. Jonasson he said that this suspension was for something that happened in 1981. I asked this woman to repeat that so I understood it clearly. Did Mr. Jonasson indicate there was a circumstance in 1981? While she did not indicate any particular circumstance she did say repeatedly that Mr. Jonasson said that he was suspended because of something that occurred in 1981. During our conversation I asked if she were aware that Mr. Jonasson had the right to appeal; she said she was not and indicated she was going to Mr. Jonasson's house that evening and speak with him to encourage him to enter into such an appeal.

On September 9, 1988, I received a telephone call from Susan Kylo, the Pastor of the Church which is the chartered partner for Troop 120.

Susan Kylo said that she had received information that Mr. Jonasson had been suspended. She indicated to me that that suspension was not a problem to her, and that she would support the Council's actions. She did ask if Mr. Jonasson was yet supposed to be meeting with his Webelos Den, and I indicated that absolutely not. She said she had knowledge he in fact was meeting with that Webelos presently, and that there was a scheduled Troop Meeting that night, and she was concerned as to what her actions should be if Mr. Jonasson were to show up.

I indicated my willingness to be at the meeting in order to help re-explain to Mr. Jonasson our position. I indicated that I would make a call to Mr. Jonasson to reinforce his suspension and would return a call to Reverend Kylo.

I subsequently made that call to Mr. Jonasson. He indicated to me that upon his return from his meeting where his membership was suspended he shared all of that information with his Pack Committee and the Pack Committee, in his words, chose to override the decision of the Council and allow him to meet with that Webelos Den. I indicated to Mr. Jonasson that was absolutely not allowed, that as part of this process, his membership was in permanent suspension and awaiting his review of that suspension, and that in no way was he to meet in any way with the Cub Scouts or the Scouts as an adult leader.

Mr. Jonasson indicated that he was not intending to meet with the Scout Troop that Monday evening.

I subsequently returned the call to Reverend Kylo and indicated that in Mr. Jonasson's eye, he viewed his suspension as temporary, since he was headed for the review process. Reverend Kylo indicated to me that that kind of thinking did not surprise her, that Mr. Jonasson was in the habit of manipulating information in his dealings with her as Reverend of that Church.

We subsequently sent the letter of September 9, 1988 to Mr. Jonasson reaffirming our position.

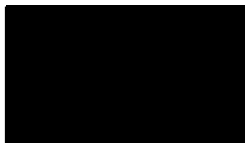

Your letter to Mr. Hoover has been referred to me for reply.

The Boy Scouts of America at every level has agonized about what the appropriate posture is to assume with reference to this problem. After careful consideration we have decided to pursue the following course of action with reference to any suggestion of misconduct on the behalf of an applicant for a leadership position within the BSA or with reference to someone who is currently holding such a position.

It is our conviction that serving as a leader in the Boy Scouts of America is a privilege and not a right. The BSA can establish and implement any set of criteria for such positions provided those criteria do not contravene law. It is also our conviction that anyone who wishes to serve as a leader in the Boy Scouts or to retain such a position at all times has the burden of proving beyond a reasonable doubt that they meet those qualifications. We have adopted as our standard of acceptability into the leadership ranks of the Boy Scouts of America the standard that no one shall be admitted or allowed to remain in those ranks if there is even a credible doubt as to their meeting all the qualifications to serve. These are our substantive provisions.

I once again reaffirmed with Mr. Olson repeatedly that the matters concerning Mr. Jonasson were confidential and would be kept that way, that Mr. Jonasson had applied for, and was receiving a review of his membership suspension. My encouragement was that he continue that process.

Mr. Olson asked specifically was any information we had current information, or information dealing with things in the past. Once again, I refused to answer that question, saying that all information we had was confidential. Mr. Olson said that were a number of parents out there who were very irritated at all of this, and were interested in writing letters and going to the media, etc., something of that nature. I indicated to Mr. Olson that while I was unable to restrict him in any way from doing whatever he thought appropriate, that my encouragement was that they would allow this process to go through, and as we explained to Mr. Jonasson that we were going to keep all matters confidential and we would encourage others to do so.

Mr. Olson then reiterated that he really had no intentions of going to the media, etc., but would like to write letters on behalf of Mr. Jonasson. I said those letters would be received and read, of course.

Mr. Olson questioned why none of the parents of the Troop or the Pack were contacted and given Mr. Jonasson's status. My response to that was that as we were preparing to go our next step, that we had repeated calls from the Committee Chairman and Committee members of both Units, who indicated that Mr. Jonasson had already shown them all of the materials and already discussed this matter thoroughly with each. During this conversation I explained to Mr. Olson, that in our view, it was extremely important that the committee be as respectful of these proceedings as anybody else, and that we would hope that they would allow them to proceed appropriately.

Procedurally, the Boy Scouts of America is not in a position to reach definitive conclusions about the morality or other personal characteristics of its leaders. Similarly, the Boy Scouts of America is not organized in a way nor funded sufficiently so that it can undertake the close supervision of designated leaders. Therefore, it must err on the side of excluding from its leadership ranks anyone about whom a credible doubt as to their qualifications to serve has been established. In a criminal process, all doubts are resolved in favor of the innocence of the defendant. In our situation, because of the practical realities we confront and because of the fiduciary relationship we have with reference to our youngsters, all doubts are resolved against admitting an applicant to a leadership position or continuing an applicant's leadership role.

We are aware that in some cases, this will result in fully qualified people being prohibited to assume or retain leadership positions in the Boy Scouts. We wish it were possible to conduct the kinds of expansive inquiries into everyone's credentials and to conduct full and complete inquiries into any charges lodged against applicants. However, the Boy Scouts does not have the resources to do that nor do we believe we are legally obligated to do so. Moreover, we do not believe that such a posture would be consistent with our commitment to ensure that all adults who have any contact with children enrolled in the Boy Scouts are beyond any credible doubt whatsoever with reference to their qualifications to serve.

We recognize that this is a tough position. However, we believe it is the only position that is consistent with our fiduciary obligation to the young people and our representations to the parents and guardians of those young people who participate by the tens of thousands in our program. Moreover, it is the only practical position with reference to the thousands of people who participate as leaders in the Boy Scouts of America.

I wish to reemphasize that the Boy Scouts of America will make no findings with reference to the truth of the charges against Mr. Jonasson. The only scope of our inquiry is to determine whether there is credible evidence to support those charges sufficient to raise a credible doubt as to Mr. Jonasson's qualifications to serve. If a

credible doubt is established, the inquiry is finished. In such case, the Boy Scouts must take the position such a leader will be severed from having any contact with the youngsters within our charge.

As an attorney, you have no doubt followed the controversy surrounding the Judge Little matter and the substantial discredit that has been brought to bear on the school in which he was accused of having misused his position. Surely both you and Mr. Jonasson wish the Boy Scouts of America well and can appreciate why it is practically necessary for us to adopt the rigorous position we have taken here in terms of safeguarding our children.

We have taken reasonable steps to ensure that no hint of improper conduct has been made by us regarding Mr. Jonasson. In fact, we personally hand delivered the letter to him rather than taking the chance that it might inadvertently fall into someone else's hands. We have met with him privately in a neutral setting so that these matters could be brought to his attention and explained. We have taken all reasonable steps to ensure that Mr. Jonasson had an opportunity to gracefully withdraw from the Boy Scouts without the slightest hint of impropriety emanating from us. We believe we owe that to those people who are excluded from leadership positions given the fact that we must take such actions in the face of imperfect knowledge.

Because of the deep respect we have for people who have dedicated time to volunteering in leadership positions in the Boy Scouts, we do provide certain appellate procedures to people whose applications for leadership positions have either been denied or suspended. However, we wish to reiterate that the purpose of those procedures is only to determine whether or not there is some credible doubt about the person's suitability to hold a leadership position. We place only a small burden of proof on the complainant, and we do not charge the committee with satisfying itself that an applicant for a leadership position is in fact guilty of the charges before that person can be excluded. As we have indicated, we will exclude people from leadership positions if there is some credible evidence from which we can infer impropriety even if, on balance, we believe it is likely that the applicant is in fact blameless.

We hope this provides some comfort to your client even though it cannot help but be a grave disappointment to him.

With reference to your requests, I regret that we will not be able to meet all of them. I am enclosing for you a copy of the national guidelines with reference to appeals from these decisions. You will note that the guidelines address the appeals at the local, regional and national levels.

I can also assure you that the Council President has appointed a committee of people who have no prior knowledge of the allegation made against your client.

As to your request for the committee to consider an additional statement from Mr. Jonasson regarding his behavior, we would be happy to receive that at the beginning of the hearing or by mail before that period.

You can receive from Mr. Hoover the name and address of the regional director.

Lastly, as to your request for a complete statement of charges, we will reveal so much of the allegations at the beginning of the hearing as will not compromise the confidentiality of the source. Essentially the committee will make its decision based on its evaluation of the credibility of the complainant and your client. Again, we wish to re-emphasize that the inquiry will not be into whether the charges against Mr. Jonasson are true, but rather whether the evidence is sufficient to raise a credible doubt as to the matter. If the committee concludes that a credible doubt has been raised, then it must affirm the decision to suspend his registration.

We wish to advise you that as soon as the hearing is completed, all written materials will be sequestered and put into a sealed file. We will issue no statements of any kind to anyone hinting or suggesting any impropriety on the basis of Mr. Jonasson. He, in turn, should be very careful what he reports to others. We have reason to believe that he has already discussed this matter with other people in scouting, and we accept no responsibility for any adverse impact his utterances may have on his standing in the community.

We can do little more than ask for the understanding of both you and your client and hope that your joint concern for the Boy Scouts of America will bring you


to the point where you can understand the reasons for the actions we are taking here.

Dear Mr. Hoover:

Please be advised that your writer has been retained to represent Dick Jonasson with respect to his suspension from the Boy Scouts of America. I am in receipt of your letter of August 22, 1988, and its enclosure. I have also had an opportunity to review Mr. Jonasson's letter of August 28, 1988, and your letters of September 2, 1988 and September 9, 1988.

I am deeply concerned about a process wherein a man who has devoted his life to the Boy Scouts is asked to respond to nebulous, vague and uncertain charges. While Mr. Jonasson and I both respect and understand the difficult position that the Chief Seattle Council may be in, there is no procedural due process where Mr. Jonasson does not have an opportunity to understand the specific nature of the charges that have been brought against him. We need to receive a full complete statement of all charges which have led to your decision to suspend Mr. Jonasson.

Your enclosure in the August 22, 1988 letter defining the appeal procedure indicates that the purpose of the committee to be appointed by the Council President is to discover the truth and arrive at a correct decision. We concur with this purpose. This purpose cannot be accomplished absent an opportunity for an individual to address the truthfulness of the allegations being made against him.

The purpose of this letter is to request full and complete copies of any and all records, files, materials or documents which pertain to your decision to suspend Mr. Jonasson from the Boy Scouts of America. While I recognize that this is perhaps not a legal proceeding with full discovery rights, fairness dictates an opportunity to review any materials which are available and to respond to those materials. By this letter, I am also requesting that you identify the document from which your appeal procedure emanates and that you forward to me full and complete copies of any and all policies, procedures or manuals which further define the

method by which the appointed committee will proceed and the subsequent appeal rights.


We are requesting that the Council President appoint as committee members only individuals who have no prior knowledge of the allegations made against Mr. Jonasson. We wish to ensure that a full and fair airing of the allegations occurs before an impartial committee who has not been subjected to any predisposed opinions. We are also of the belief that this matter should proceed as expeditiously as possible and we request that the committee issue its confidential report within sixty days of the date of this letter.

You should also be aware that the August 28, 1988 letter which my client wrote to you is not his entire version of the facts supporting his claim. We intend to supplement the original request and provide a further, detailed written statement upon receipt of information concerning the exact nature and extent of the allegations being made.

I would also appreciate receiving the name and address of the Regional Director, together with a statement concerning whether or not that individual has been contacted by yourself or any officers or agents of the Chief Seattle Council and, if so, I would like to know the nature and extent of any communication made in this regard. The same information is sought with respect to the National Council.

I would appreciate receiving a response to this correspondence within five working days of your receipt of this letter. If it is not possible for you to fully respond within that timeframe, please provide as much information as can be provided and also advise me when I might anticipate a full response.

In order to make valuable use of your time this Friday, here is a list of questions you may be able to review prior to our arrival. Mr. Jonasson has requested a review of our suspension of his membership. We have four members of our Board to serve on the review committee.

1. The victim in this circumstance, has stressed his desire for confidentiality, and has placed that desire in writing in his letter describing the incident. May we share his name with the committee? May we share his name with Mr. Jonasson?
2. Do we ask the youth to appear with the committee? May we ask the Therapist, Sean Watt to substantiate the accusations? Do we allow Mr. Jonasson to have anyone speak on his behalf to the committee?
3. In your opinion, where would we stand in these circumstances? Mr. Jonasson hears the information and flatly denies all of it, and continues his denial. Number two - Mr. Jonasson confirms some portion of these allegations, however, says that was in the past and since that time has changed his ways totally, has a record of performance to prove that, and people who will speak on his behalf.
4. We will be drafting a letter of response to Mr. Jonasson on Friday, however, we would like to discuss the potential content of that letter with you during our meeting.

Richard Jonasson arrived at the Scout Service Center with two friends described as members of the Troop Committee. Mr. Jonasson was carrying a tape recorder. He was greeted by Norman Stone. The two friends were asked to wait in the lobby of the Scout Service Center and Mr. Jonasson was escorted to a private room to the side, and introduced to C. Michael Hoover, Scout Executive. Mr. Jonasson requested his two friends be present and that he be allowed to tape this conversation. Both requests were denied. Mr. Hoover indicated that we did not agree to have this conversation taped, (nor was the Scout Service Center taping this conversation).

Mr. Jonasson was informed that the Council had evidence that he did not meet the standards of membership and leadership in the Boy Scouts of America, and was delivered the appropriate letter suspending his registration and the appropriate procedure for requesting review of this decision denying his registration, and a check for \$5.00 refunding his application fee. It was made clear to Mr. Jonasson that we were making no accusations against him. This action was based on the information given to us. We explained we were motivated by our concern to provide the highest standards of membership in the Boy Scouts of America and for the protection of youth participating in our program.

Mr. Jonasson indicated he was confused and perplexed by this action and was totally unaware of any circumstance which might cause this action to be taken. He did indicate that at one time he had a problem with alcohol, but his operation since had been "squeaky clean". He pressed for more details regarding the circumstance, and was told repeatedly that these details were confidential. Mr. Jonasson said he could only imagine that the complaint would be for moral issues. Finally, after much discussion, Mr. Jonasson was made aware that the general complaint was of a sexual abuse.

Mr. Jonasson asked us to define what was meant by sexual abuse, indicating that he was on occasion affectionate with children and there was touching and hugging of children participating in his unit. We did not comment on a definition of sexual abuse.

Mr. Jonasson asked a series of questions and made statements such as; "Was this a complaint or complaints?" Was the complaint from a member of his Unit or was it from a parent? "To accuse me is like calling Jesus Christ the Devil. The boys in my unit all like me."

We repeatedly stated the confidential nature of this information, and that only Mr. Jonasson and ourselves were dealing with the information. Our encouragement was that this information be kept confidential, and that Mr. Jonasson follow the procedure for appeal if he felt it appropriate.

Mr. Jonasson indicated he would be discussing this matter with members of his committee. He was reminded, once again, if for any reason he felt that this action was inappropriate, that his best course of action was to follow the procedure for requesting review. We stated that we would be available to him anytime if he had further questions. On his departure, Mr. Hoover observed Mr. Jonasson showing the paperwork to his friends as they stood in the parking lot of the Service Center.

RE: Registration Suspension

Dear Mr. Hoover,

I am responding to your notice of suspension. After our meeting, I considered our discussion very carefully. I do not understand the basis of this decision.

I find it difficult to respond with an appeal when I do not understand what the Boy Scouts of America mean by the term "sexual exploitation". I am requesting to know who was involved, what allegedly happened, where it allegedly occurred, and when. It is important to me, to have this information so that I can adequately determine if I acted inappropriately.

Since I was thirteen I have been dedicated to scouting. I consider it my ministry to nurture the spiritual, moral, and physical growth of the many scouts that have, and I hope, will share their lives with me. I became certain that I must take up this calling when I was twenty years old. I was allowed to participate in the "1912 Gillwell Woodbadge Training Course (#609-2)". On my last evening some of the older Woodbadge scouters took me aside and offered me a charge. I was told they 'had given me the best they had to give me, and charged me to share what they had given me with my boys, even those not yet born!'

Since then I have done my best to uphold this challenge and would not abuse, jeopardize, nor compromise the scouting oath.

In conclusion I can not give my version of the facts surrounding this claim - since I am not aware of doing anything wrong. It is my hope that the committee will meet very soon and I invite them to interview all the boys, parents and leadership with whom I am associated in scouting.

I am confident they will attest to my character, my morales, and my high standards for the Scouting program.

Registration Suspension Meeting - 8/22/88

Richard Jonasson arrived at the Scout Service Center with two friends described as members of the Troop Committee. Mr. Jonasson was carrying a tape recorder. He was greeted by Norman Stone. The two friends were asked to wait in the lobby of the Scout Service Center and Mr. Jonasson was escorted to a private room to the side, and introduced to C. Michael Hoover, Scout Executive. Mr. Jonasson requested his two friends be present and that he be allowed to tape this conversation. Both requests were denied. Mr. Hoover indicated that we did not agree to have this conversation taped, (nor was the Scout Service Center taping this conversation).

Mr. Jonasson was informed that the Council had evidence that he did not meet the standards of membership and leadership in the Boy Scouts of America, and was delivered the appropriate letter suspending his registration and the appropriate procedure for requesting review of this decision denying his registration, and a check for \$5.00 refunding his application fee. It was made clear to Mr. Jonasson that we were making no accusations against him. This action was based on the information given to us. We explained we were motivated by our concern to provide the highest standards of membership in the Boy Scouts of America and for the protection of youth participating in our program.

Mr. Jonasson indicated he was confused and perplexed by this action and was totally unaware of any circumstance which might cause this action to be taken. He did indicate that at one time he had a problem with alcohol, but his operation since had been "squeaky clean". He pressed for more details regarding the circumstance, and was told repeatedly that these details were confidential. Mr. Jonasson said he could only imagine that the complaint would be for moral issues. Finally, after much discussion, Mr. Jonasson was made aware that the general complaint was of a sexual abuse.

Mr. Jonasson asked us to define what was meant by sexual abuse, indicating that he was on occasion affectionate with children and there was touching and hugging of children participating in his unit. We did not comment on a definition of sexual abuse.

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We repeatedly stated the confidential nature of this information, and that only Mr. Jonasson and ourselves were dealing with the information. Our encouragement was that this information be kept confidential, and that Mr. Jonasson follow the procedure for appeal if he felt it appropriate.

Mr. Jonasson indicated he would be discussing this matter with members of his committee. He was reminded, once again, if for any reason he felt that this action was inappropriate, that his best course of action was to follow the procedure for requesting review. We stated that we would be available to him anytime if he had further questions. On his departure, Mr. Hoover observed Mr. Jonasson showing the paperwork to his friends as they stood in the parking lot of the Service Center.

Norman J. Stone received a telephone call from [REDACTED] who introduced himself as a former Scout, who had been sexually assaulted by his Scoutmaster. During this conversation these allegations were made by [REDACTED]

1. [REDACTED] was sixteen at the time he was enrolled in and participating in Troop 120 of St. Paul's Lutheran Church. [REDACTED] is now 23.
2. As a result of this occurrence, [REDACTED] has felt extreme anxiety and finally has decided to see a therapist. He was being treated by Sern Watt of the Queen Ann Family Medical Center. At the encouragement of his Therapist he made this call.
3. [REDACTED] indicated he has told this information to the present and former pastor of the St. Paul's Lutheran Church and has related this information to his parents. He also indicated he called the King County Prosecuting Attorney and was told the statute of limitations had expired on this kind of complaint. [REDACTED] made it clear that in consultation with his Therapist, he was taking the next step and reporting this incident to the Boy Scouts of America.
4. [REDACTED] explained his motivation for this telephone call was to have Mr. Jonasson removed from Scouting so he could not do to other children what had been done to him.
5. [REDACTED] described an event at a Camporee at Ft. Lewis. Mr. Jonasson and many Scouts were sleeping in the same tent. [REDACTED] was next to Mr. Jonasson. Mr. Jonasson attempted to grab him and use him in a sexual way. Mr. Jonasson was swearing and masterbating.
6. [REDACTED] indicated that Richard Jonasson had problems with alcohol.
7. [REDACTED] also indicated that on an occasion at Camp Shepherd, Mr. Jonasson would wrestle around with kids and rub against them for extended periods of time.
8. [REDACTED] indicated that Mr. Jonasson would get very depressed and take him aside and in his words, "lay the weight on my shoulders".
9. [REDACTED] said that while he was making this report, and felt compelled to do so, he was extremely concerned as to his confidentiality and would fear some reprisal by Mr. Jonasson.
10. [REDACTED] gave Norman Stone permission to telephone his Therapist to verify this information.

A call was placed to Sern Watt, [REDACTED] Therapist. During the discussion, Mr. Watt indicated that in his experience in comparison to cases that he has dealt with in the past, he felt [REDACTED] statements were credible. [REDACTED] in his opinion, was not behaving in a manner that would suggest he was making this up or had anything to hide.

Norman J. Stone had an additional conversation with [REDACTED] and asked if he would be willing to put his statement in writing. Subsequently, a letter, dated August 10, 1988, was received in this office on August 12, 1988. Norman J. Stone tried to contact Richard Jonasson by phone from August 16 through August 21, 1988. 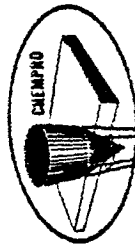
APPLICANT PROCEDURE FOR REQUESTING REVIEW
OF DECISION DENYING REGISTRATION

1. If registration is refused, the applicant may request a review of this decision. This request must be in the form of a written request from the individual which includes his or her version of the facts supporting the claim that registration should not have been denied.
2. Upon receipt of the written request for review, the president of the local council shall appoint a committee to review the situation.
3. The appointed committee should review the facts as presented, and, in addition, may interview any persons whose testimony might assist the committee in discovering the truth and arriving at a correct decision.
4. A confidential report will be given to the applicant setting forth the decision of the committee.
5. The applicant may-if he or she does not agree with the decision-request a review from the regional director.
6. If the regional review does not satisfy the applicant, he or she may ask for further review by the National Council. The decision by the National Council is final.
