On Sunday, March 31, 1985, I and Richard G. Mooneyham, Chairman of our Weyanoke District met with Mr. W. J. Jamerson, Jr. of Farmville, Virginia at 3:30 p.m. at the Farmville United Methodist Church.

WILBUR J JAMERSON JR.

After a cordial greeting, in which Mr. Jamerson expressed remorse for the circumstances requiring the meeting, Dick Mooneyham read to Mr. Jamerson the attached letter. At the conclusion his reading Mr. Mooneyham gave the original of the letter to Mr. Jamerson. At this point I verbally reiterated the key points that (1) Scouting can deny adult registration to any leader it feels does not meet our standards, (2) we wished to keep this information confidential, (3) if he wished to appeal he should contact, in writing, the council president.

At this point Mr. Jamerson, with a quiet display of emotion, stated that he hoped someday to be able to return to Scouting as a volunteer leader. He stated that he did not wish to bring any embarrassment to Scouting. He also expressed his appreciation for what Scouting had done for him as he grew up. He looked forward to being rehabilitated and took full responsibility for his actions.

I next thanked Mr. Jamerson for his positive attitude and asked if he was receiving any professional help. Jamerson then stated that he was engaged in regular group therapy at the Henrico Mental Health Center along with eight other men who had been convicted of sex abuse charges.

To conclude the meeting Mr. Mooneyham expressed to Mr. Jamerson best wishes for the future and we exited the church at approximately 3:40 p.m.



Dear Mr. Jamerson:

After careful review, we have decided that your registration with the Boy Scouts of America should be suspended. We are therefore compelled to request that you sever any relations that you may have with the Boy Scouts of America.

You should understand that BSA leadership registration is a privilege and is not automatically granted to everyone who applies. We reserve the right to suspend registration whenever there is a concern that an individual may not measure up to the high standards of leadership which the BSA seeks to provide for American youth. Please also understand that this decision and the reasons for it will be maintained as confidential.

If you wish to have this decision reviewed, please write to me, explaining your version of the facts supporting your claim that your registration as a BSA leader should be granted or reinstated.

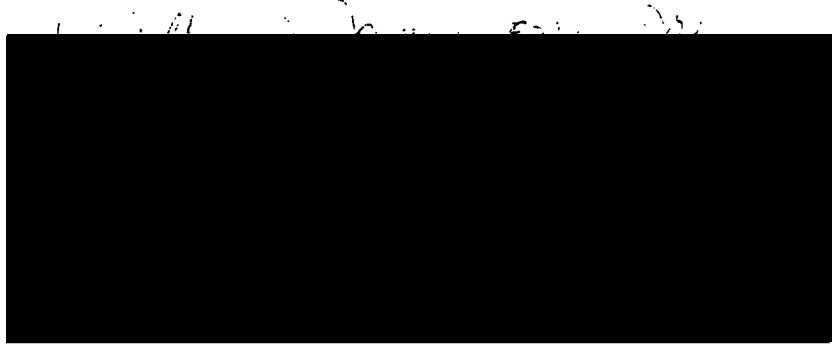

I sincerely hope better times are in your future.

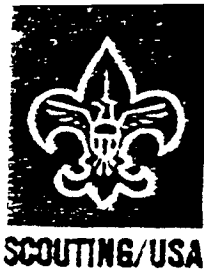

Circumstances

W. J. Jamerson, Jr., currently a troop committee member, has been charged with child abuse and/or sexual battery in Price Edward and Buckingham counties in the Commonwealth of Virginia. The charges in Buckingham County were brought by the parents of former Scout [REDACTED].

Geographical/Social Setting

Buckingham County is a geographically large rural county in the central part of Virginia approximately sixty miles west of the Council headquarters city of Richmond. The county has a dominate middle class population with employment a mix of mining, lumber, agriculture, retail, and commuters to adjoining localities.

Scouting enjoys a long standing, very positive image in the community. Youth in the county are afforded a quality Scouting program, and Buckingham has been a consistent and broad based financial supporter of the council including one major giver (\$1000 annually) who has a child in the program.

Information Sources

- 1 - Charter field sheets for Troop 6535, Dillwyn Elementary School, PTA, Dillwyn, Virginia - used primarily to determine registration overlap of Jamerson and [REDACTED]
- 2 - Troop 6535 advancement reports filed with the Council - used primarily to verify degree of activity the [REDACTED] child had in Scouting.
- 3 - Telephone conversation and personal interview with troop scoutmaster H. Spencer Adams (also principal of Buchingham Primary School) on December 5 and December 20, 1984 respectively.
- 4 - Telephone conversations with Commonwealth Attorney E. M. Wright between December 6 and 18, 1984 in which Mr. Wright in off-the-record comments verified that Jamerson had been charged in a youth offense, that he pleaded "no contest", and that the case had been taken under advisement while both parties underwent psychological care.
- 5 The balance of the information in this report was gained from H. Spencer Adams. While much of this is hearsay in nature, but I feel it is credible. Spencer Adams is a school principal and a highly recognized community leader not only in Scouting but also in his church and in numerous civic endeavors. I feel it is important to note that he enjoys a close working relationship through his professional and civic responsibilities with the Commonwealth Attorney E. M. Wright and the attorney for W. J. Jamerson. Both of these men are strong supporters of Scouting, Wright being a member of the district committee and Snoddy, a leader in the SME efforts in the community. Herbert Maxey, attorney for [REDACTED], is Mr. Adams' [REDACTED] being married to Spencer's [REDACTED].

The point of this piece of background is that Adams had conversations with all three attorneys at varying points during the fall of 1984 concerning the Jamerson/[REDACTED] case, and I therefore consider Adams a quite reliable source.

Investigative Problems

Charges brought against W. J. Jamerson, Jr. are being handled by the juvenile and domestic relations court. He has pleaded "no contest" to at least two charges involving three youth in two counties. He asked the court to take his plea under advisement while he sought psychological help. The court agreed.

Virginia law dictates that cases before the juvenile court be treated confidentially to protect the youth involved. Therefore, it has been impossible to verify any of the apparent charges or to gather any specific facts concerning the charges against W. J. Jamerson.

I am advised (by the Commonwealth Attorney) that delays in verifying these charges could be quite lengthy and will likely require a minimum of twelve months.

During the summer of 1984 he and his wife moved to Farmville, Virginia (Prince Edward County). At this time Jamerson was employed by the state of Virginia at the Powhatan Correctional Institution where he was a guard.

o Troop records do not show boy attendance, but dues payment records reflect a sporatic participation through October 1983.
o In July of 1982 the Scoutmaster accepted a second application to be a scout though he was registered at the time (it seems a clear reinforcement of sporatic participation by the [REDACTED] child).
o Troop financial records also reflect participation in troop fund raising efforts in the fall of 1982 and the fall of 1983.

Significant Points made by Adams

- o Jamerson's abusive relationship with [REDACTED] began when [REDACTED] was 3 years old or about 1977 - four years before [REDACTED] joined troop 6535 in June of 1981.
- o [REDACTED] and W. J. Jamerson, Jr. are first cousins by marriage. [REDACTED] aunt is married to Jamerson, Jr.'s [REDACTED].
- o The two parties lived approximately three miles from each other.
- o When Jamerson, Jr. moved from Buckingham to Farmville, Virginia during the summer of 1984, the [REDACTED] family assisted him with the physical move.

Chronology of Events

1. In August of 1984, W. J. Jamerson, Jr. was charged in Prince Edward County with child abuse and sodomy in reference to the two small children (4-6 years old) of a co-worker at Powhatan Correctional Institution.

Chronology of Events (continued)

2. In September, 1984, Jamerson approached Spencer Adams and asked him to serve as a character witness on his behalf in the court matter.
3. September - November
 - o Adams heard nothing further from Jamerson, but learned that the felony charge had been apparently reduced to a misdemeanor. After this court action came to light in the community, it was then that [REDACTED] apparently told his parents of his relationship with W. J. Jamerson, Jr. which resulted in Jamerson being charged in Buckingham County with sexual battery against the Patton child.
 - o The county social service department initiated an investigation of the case.
 - o [REDACTED] began counseling/therapy at Cross Roads Mental Health Services.
4. December 5, 1984, Spencer Adams telephoned me with the information that Jamerson had been charged and that he had been questioned by Herbert Maxey about B.S.A. liability insurance.

Additional Background

Spencer Adams, the Scoutmaster, feels the opportunity for any abuse from Jamerson would be limited to occasions of transporting Patton to or from troop meetings. The two never attended camp or camping trips together.

Jamerson performed primarily administrative duties for the troop during his adult registration period. These efforts were sporadic. He did help with one troop activity - community service project - but [REDACTED] did not participate. At no time during Jamerson's Scouting tenure did Mr. Adams observe any suspicious behavior on the part of Jamerson.

Adams describes the [REDACTED] child as quite immature. He had problems of adjusting to the public school setting, and his parents removed him and placed him in a small church - basement private school in an adjoining county.

Mr. Adams further expressed the view that the [REDACTED] originally proclaimed no ill will toward Jamerson or the B.S.A., but that after counseling sessions began, their position hardened.

Just prior to my interview with Adams, Herbert Maxey called the council office to seek assistance in identifying whom he should contact regarding a damage claim for former Scout [REDACTED]. Maxey stated that he did not believe that the Scouts were liable in this case. Rather he said he was seeking, for his client an amount of money to cover the 20% of counseling charges the family medical insurance (Blue Cross) would not cover. After discussing this phone call with our Council Attorney Francis Lowden and Dave Parks, National BSA Attorney, I called Mr. Maxey and suggested he put into writing [REDACTED] claim and send this to us for review. (Mr. Maxey asked, at the end of the conversation, if I would please, on his behalf, encourage Spencer Adams and his troop committee to not take the [REDACTED] action personally!)

Dear Mr. Tate:

As we discussed in our recent telephone conversation, this letter will serve to summarize the events involving Assistant Scoutmaster W. J. Jamerson and our client, [REDACTED]

[REDACTED] was a member of the Boy Scout Troop for which W. J. Jamerson served as Assistant Scoutmaster until recently. Apparently, on numerous occasions Mr. Jamerson sexually assaulted [REDACTED] in Jamerson's car after picking [REDACTED] up from his parents home to take [REDACTED] to Scout meetings.

It appears that Mr. Jamerson's position as a Scout leader made it much easier for him to have frequent and apparently legitimate contacts with [REDACTED] over a period of several years. The activities of Mr. Jamerson only recently came to the attention of [REDACTED] parents when blood was discovered in [REDACTED] underpants. The parents immediately reported Mr. Jamerson to the authorities.

Mr. Jamerson was charged with committing sodomy with a minor and as a result of a plea bargain, pleaded nolo contendere on the lesser charge of sexual assault.

As a result of the actions of Mr. Jamerson, [REDACTED] has suffered possibly permanent psychological damage, as have his parents. The trauma of going through the episodes with Mr. Jamerson and then having to recount those episodes for Court cannot be over-emphasized. As of January 4, 1985, [REDACTED] had received 17 psychotherapy treatments at Crossroads Services and was scheduled for at least ten more sessions (see attached letter). These sessions also necessitate school absence as did the immediate trauma of these incidents. Obviously, at this time it is impossible to estimate what permanent psychological scars may be left.



The psychotherapy sessions have involved counselling for both [REDACTED] and his parents. [REDACTED] have had to lose time from work in order to attend the sessions with [REDACTED]; they also have experienced the horror, shock and anger any parent would feel when by such an assault on their child.

Given the impossibility of determining long-term psychological damage to either [REDACTED] or his parents, and the horror already experienced by [REDACTED] and his parents, it would appear that a settlement figure of \$35,000.00 would be most conservative. The specials in this case are of insignificance compared to the injury.

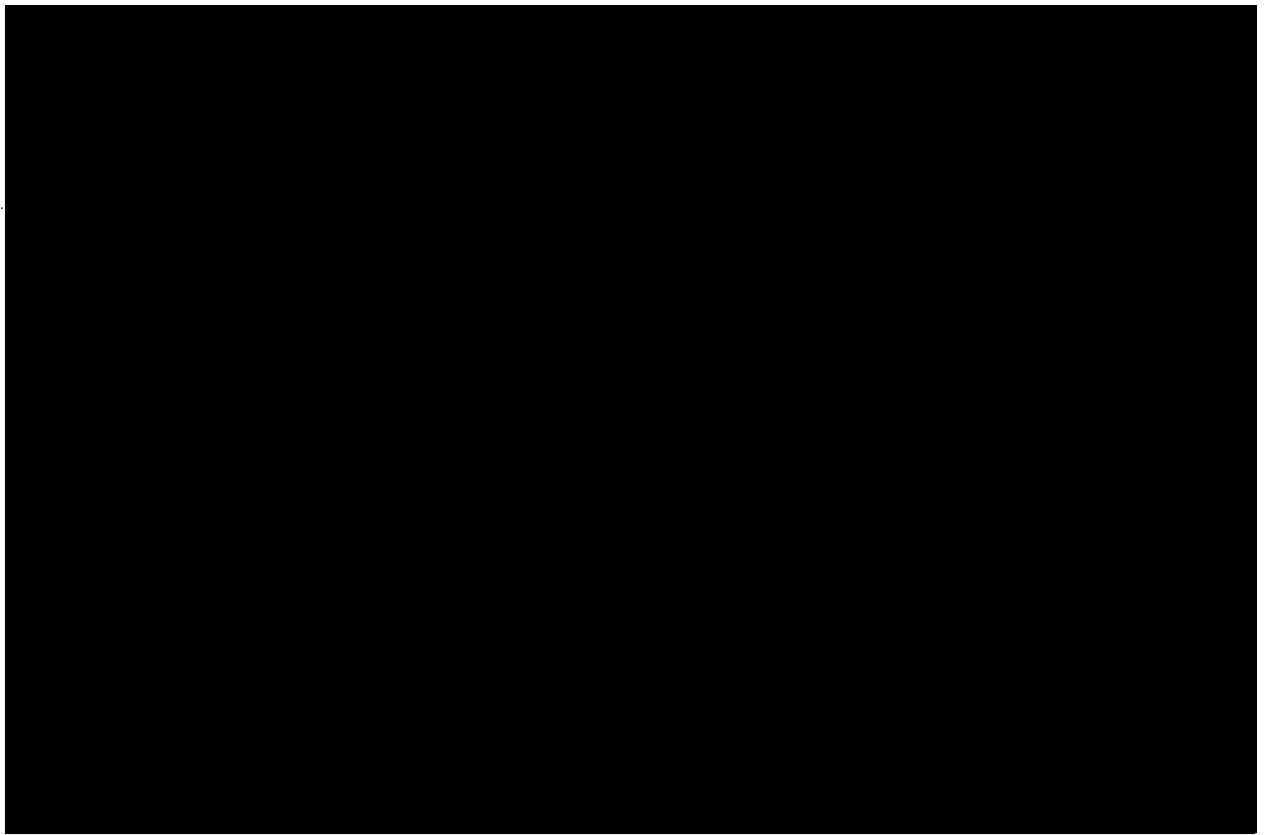



Circumstances

W. J. Jamerson, Jr., currently a troop committee member, has been charged with child abuse and/or sexual battery in Price Edward and Buckingham counties in the Commonwealth of Virginia. The charges in Buckingham County were brought by the parents of former Scout [REDACTED].

Geographical/Social Setting

Buckingham County is a geographically large rural county in the central part of Virginia approximately sixty miles west of the Council headquarters city of Richmond. The county has a dominate middle class population with employment a mix of mining, lumber, agriculture, retail, and commuters to adjoining localities.

Scouting enjoys a long standing, very positive image in the community. Youth in the county are afforded a quality Scouting program, and Buckingham has been a consistent and broad based financial supporter of the council including one major giver (\$1000 annually) who has a child in the program.

Information Sources

- 1 - Charter field sheets for Troop 6535, Dillwyn Elementary School, PTA, Dillwyn, Virginia - used primarily to determine registration overlap of Jamerson and [REDACTED]
- 2 - Troop 6535 advancement reports filed with the Council - used primarily to verify degree of activity the [REDACTED] child had in Scouting.
- 3 - Telephone conversation and personal interview with troop scoutmaster H. Spencer Adams (also principal of Buchingham Primary School) on December 5 and December 20, 1984 respectively.
- 4 - Telephone conversations with Commonwealth Attorney E. M. Wright between December 6 and 18, 1984 in which Mr. Wright in off-the-record comments verified that Jamerson had been charged in a youth offense, that he pleaded "no contest", and that the case had been taken under advisement while both parties underwent psychological care.
- 5 The balance of the information in this report was gained from H. Spencer Adams. While much of this is hearsay in nature, but I feel it is credible. Spencer Adams is a school principal and a highly recognized community leader not only in Scouting but also in his church and in numerous civic endeavors. I feel it is important to note that he enjoys a close working relationship through his professional and civic responsibilities with the Commonwealth Attorney E. M. Wright and the attorney for W. J. Jamerson. Both of these men are strong supporters of Scouting, Wright being a member of the district committee and Snoddy, a leader in the SME efforts in the community. Herbert Maxey, attorney for [REDACTED] is Mr. Adam's [REDACTED] being married to Spencer's [REDACTED]

The point of this piece of background is that Adams had conversations with all three attorneys at varying points during the fall of 1984 concerning the Jamerson/[REDACTED] case, and I therefore consider Adams a quite reliable source.

Investigative Problems

Charges brought against W. J. Jamerson, Jr. are being handled by the juvenile and domestic relations court. He has pleaded "no contest" to at least two charges involving three youth in two counties. He asked the court to take his plea under advisement while he sought psychological help. The court agreed.

Virginia law dictates that cases before the juvenile court be treated confidentially to protect the youth involved. Therefore, it has been impossible to verify any of the apparent charges or to gather any specific facts concerning the charges against W. J. Jamerson.

I am advised (by the Commonwealth Attorney) that delays in verifying these charges could be quite lengthy and will likely require a minimum of twelve months.

- o [REDACTED] and W. J. Jamerson, Jr. are [REDACTED] by marriage. [REDACTED] is married to Jamerson, Jr.'s [REDACTED]
- o The two parties lived approximately three miles from each other.
- o When Jamerson, Jr. moved from Buckingham to Farmville, Virginia during the summer of 1984, the [REDACTED] family assisted him with the physical move.

Chronology of Events

1. In August of 1984, W. J. Jamerson, Jr. was charged in Prince Edward County with child abuse and sodomy in reference to the two small children (4-6 years old) of a co-worker at Powhatan Correctional Institution.

2. In September, 1984, Jamerson approached Spencer Adams and asked him to serve as a character witness on his behalf in the court matter.
3. September - November
 - o Adams heard nothing further from Jamerson, but learned that the felony charge had been apparently reduced to a misdemeanor. After this court action came to light in the community, it was then that [REDACTED] apparently told his parents of his relationship with W. J. Jamerson, Jr. which resulted in Jamerson being charged in Buckingham County with sexual battery against the [REDACTED] child.
 - o The county social service department initiated an investigation of the case.
 - o [REDACTED] began counseling/therapy at Cross Roads Mental Health Services.
4. December 5, 1984, Spencer Adams telephoned me with the information that Jamerson had been charged and that he had been questioned by Herbert Maxey about B.S.A. liability insurance.

Additional Background

Spencer Adams, the Scoutmaster, feels the opportunity for any abuse from Jamerson would be limited to occasions of transporting [REDACTED] to or from troop meetings. The two never attended camp or camping trips together.

Jamerson performed primarily administrative duties for the troop during his adult registration period. These efforts were sporadic. He did help with one troop activity - community service project - but [REDACTED] did not participate. At no time during Jamerson's Scouting tenure did Mr. Adams observe any suspicious behavior on the part of Jamerson.

Adams describes the [REDACTED] child as quite immature. He had problems of adjusting to the public school setting, and his parents removed him and placed him in a small church - basement private school in an adjoining county.

Mr. Adams further expressed the view that the [REDACTED] originally proclaimed no ill will toward Jamerson or the B.S.A., but that after counseling sessions began, their position hardened.

Just prior to my interview with Adams, Herbert Maxey called the council office to seek assistance in identifying whom he should contact regarding a damage claim for former Scout [REDACTED]. Maxey stated that he did not believe that the Scouts were liable in this case. Rather he said he was seeking, for his client an amount of money to cover the 20% of counseling charges the family medical insurance (Blue Cross) would not cover. After discussing this phone call with our Council Attorney Francis Lowden and Dave Parks, National BSA Attorney, I called Mr. Maxey and suggested he put into writing [REDACTED]'s claim and send this to us for review. (Mr. Maxey asked, at the end of the conversation, if I would please, on his behalf, encourage Spencer Adams and his troop committee to not take the [REDACTED] action personally!)

Dear Mr. Tate:

As we discussed in our recent telephone conversation, this letter will serve to summarize the events involving Assistant Scoutmaster W. J. Jamerson and our client [REDACTED]

[REDACTED] was a member of the Boy Scout Troop for which W. J. Jamerson served as Assistant Scoutmaster until recently. Apparently, on numerous occasions Mr. Jamerson sexually assaulted [REDACTED] in Jamerson's car after picking [REDACTED] up from his parents home to take [REDACTED] to Scout meetings.

It appears that Mr. Jamerson's position as a Scout leader made it much easier for him to have frequent and apparently legitimate contacts with [REDACTED] over a period of several years. The activities of Mr. Jamerson only recently came to the attention of [REDACTED] parents when blood was discovered in [REDACTED] underpants. The parents immediately reported Mr. Jamerson to the authorities.

Mr. Jamerson was charged with committing sodomy with a minor and as a result of a plea bargain, pleaded nolo contendere on the lesser charge of sexual assault.

As a result of the actions of Mr. Jamerson, [REDACTED] has suffered possibly permanent psychological damage, as have his parents. The trauma of going through the episodes with Mr. Jamerson and then having to recount those episodes for Court cannot be over-emphasized. As of January 4, 1985, [REDACTED] had received 17 psychotherapy treatments at Crossroads Services and was scheduled for at least ten more sessions (see attached letter). These sessions also necessitate school absence as did the immediate trauma of these incidents. Obviously, at this time it is impossible to estimate what permanent psychological scars may be left.



The psychotherapy sessions have involved counselling for both [REDACTED] and his parents. [REDACTED] have had to lose time from work in order to attend the sessions with [REDACTED] they also have experienced the horror, shock and anger any parent would feel when by such an assault on their child.

Given the impossibility of determining long-term psychological damage to either [REDACTED] or his parents, and the horror already experienced by [REDACTED] and his parents, it would appear that a settlement figure of \$35,000.00 would be most conservative. The specials in this case are of insignificance compared to the injury.
