# Boy Scouts to appeal

## Abuse case award tops \$4 million

IRVING. — The national Boy Scouts of America has decided to appeal a jury verdict last week in Corvallis, Ore., that awarded \$4.24 million to a 19-year-old youth who was sexually abused by a scoutmaster from 1982 to 1984.

"Our attorneys have recommended an appeal," Boy Scouts spokesman Barclay Bollas said Thursday, declining to comment on the reasons for the decision.

Bollas said the judgment — the largest in the organization's history — could have an impact "if a trend of lawsuits of this nature were to continue."

The national organization was ordered by the judge to pay a share of the \$40,000 in general damages assessed against the Oregon Trail Council. The Oregon council was ordered to pay \$2 million in punitive damages.

In April 1987 a jury in Corvallis, Oregon awarded \$540,000 in compensatory damages and \$2,000,000 in punitive damages to a young man who claimed to have been sexually abused by his scoutmaster.

Compensatory damages are intended to compensate a victim for injury and punitive damages are intended to punish a wrongdoer for willful, wanton, or gross misconduct.

BSA and the local council appealed the award and we are pleased to report that on July 17, 1989 the Oregon appellate court vacated the award of punitive damages on the grounds that BSA and the local council had not engaged in such improper conduct.

# Scout ex-leader admits charges

CORVALLIS (AP) — A former Boy Scout leader, who had been honored for his 21 years of volunteer service to the youth group, has pleaded guilty to misdemeanor charges stemming from the sexual abuse of a 16-year-old boy he met through his Scout troop.

William E. Tobiassen, a 57-year-old Corvallis insurance agent, pleaded guilty Wednesday to second-degree sexual abuse and contributing to the sexual delinquency of a minor. The pleas were entered in Benton County District Court.

## In brief

Each charge is punishable by up to one year in jail and a \$2,500 fine. Sentencing was set for Oct. 31.

# Tobiassen pleads guilty

William E. Tobiassen pleaded guilty Wednesday to charges of sexual abuse of a 16-year-old boy that the former scout leader met through scouting activities.

Dressed in a gray, pin-stripe business suit, the 57-year-old Corvallis insurance agent pleaded guilty in Benton County District Court to second-degree sexual abuse and contributing to the sexual delinquency of a minor.

Tobiassen, 426 N.W. 30th St., had been given high honors for his volun-

teer service to the Boy Scouts and has participated in scouting for 21 years.

Each charge is a misdemeanor punishable by up to one year in jail and a \$2,500 fine. Tobiassen will be sentenced Oct. 11.

He had pleaded innocent to the

charges July 11 following an investigation that began May 21 when a parent of the boy complained to authorities. Tobiassen was released on his own recognizance and ordered to report to Oregon State Hospital in Salem for evaluation to determine whether he is a sexually dangerous person.

He was examined at the hospital Aug. 7 through Aug. 14, said Michael J. Brown, Marion County district attorney.

Brown is prosecuting the case at the request of Peter F. Sandrock Jr., Benton County district attorney. Sandrock thought it improper for him to handle the case because Tobiassen participated in Sandrock's 1982 re-election campaign.

Judge John S. Horton of Linn County District Court is presiding over the case at the request of Judge Henry R. Dickerson of Benton County. Dickerson disqualified himself be-

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cause he has known Tobiassen for many years and has worked with him professionally and through the Boy Scouts.

Brown declined to discuss Tobiassen's evaluation at the hospital, but said he will ask that Tobiassen be placed on five years probation and committed to the hospital for treatment as a dangerous sex offender.

Thomas L. Gallagher, Tobiassen's Corvallis lawyer, said his client would plead guilty to the charges on the condition that Brown not file further charges of sexual misconduct against Tobiassen.

Neither he nor Brown would talk about any other cases or allegations against Tobiassen.

Tobiassen declined to comment after pleading guilty.

Court records show the sexual delinquency incident occurred Jan. 30, and the sexual abuse occurred between April 28 and May 5.

Sexual abuse is defined as touching sexually private parts of the body. Contributing to the sexual delinquency of a minor involves sexual activity described as deviant, including oral sex.

Tobiassen is a life insurance agent for Mutual Life Insurance Co. of New York and was honored by the company in August 1983 for his volunteer work with the Oregon Trail Council of the Boy Scouts.

## Corvallis man faces charges of sex abuse

CORVALLIS (AP) — The winner of a volunteer service award from the Boy Scouts has been charged with sexually abusing a 16-year-old boy.

Authorities say the man charged met the boy during scouting activities.

Corvallis insurance agent William Elwood Tobiasen, 57, pleaded innocent Wednesday in Benton County District Court to charges of second-degree sexual abuse and contributing to the sexual delinquency of a minor.

Each charge is a misdemeanor punishable by up to one year in jail and a \$2,500 fine. The case was continued for trial or subsequent court appearances.

After the brief court appearance, Tobiasen was booked into the Benton County Jail and released on his own recognizance. He was ordered to report to Oregon State Hospital in Salem for evaluation. He was also ordered to have no contact with the victim.

If he is declared a sexually dangerous person, Tobiasen could be sent to the hospital for treatment.

Tobiasen is a life insurance agent for Mutual Life Insurance Co. of New York. He was honored by the company in August 1983 for his volunteer work with the Oregon Trail Council of the Boy Scouts of America.

He had been involved in scouting for 21 years and received the Silver Beaver Award, the highest award given to an adult volunteer at the council level.

Until about nine months ago, Tobiasen was scoutmaster of Troop 186 in Corvallis, said Ralph Brodbeck, who is scoutmaster of the troop.

Brodbeck said Tobiasen quit participating in troop activities about nine months ago because he was involved in other activities.

He was removed from scouting entirely when Boy Scouts of America officials learned Tobiasen was being investigated for alleged sexual misconduct.

Brodbeck said he served as assistant scoutmaster to Tobiasen.

Tobiasen has four sons, three of whom are Eagle Scouts.

The charges resulted from an investigation that began May 21 when a parent of the victim complained to authorities, according to Detective Stan Robson of the Benton County sheriff's department.

Robson wouldn't say whether the alleged sexual misconduct happened during scouting activities.

Neither Tobiasen nor his lawyer would comment on the charges.

### Guilt not proven

Gazette-Times reporter George Wisner's July 12 article regarding William Tobiassen's alleged misdemeanors is both irresponsible and inappropriate. This lengthy account of Tobiassen's arraignment on charges of second-degree sexual abuse and contributing to the sexual delinquency of a minor infringes on the defendant's right to be considered innocent until proven guilty.

I am aware that there is nothing illegal in what Wisner has written. Journalists have been guilty of sensationalism and invasion of privacy for longer than I've been around. However, Corvallis is unlike large urban centers where such reportage would probably be lost in the shuffle. Here it is front-page news, and of course sells papers.

I have known Bill for more than a decade and I feel he deserves better, as do his

wife and four sons. If he is tried and found guilty, the state has resources to help him. If he is judged innocent, how will the Gazette-Times right the wrong done him?

Meanwhile, the rest of us would do well to regard this entire affair in ways both benevolent and humane.

# X-scouter denies charge of sex abuse

A Corvallis insurance agent honored for his volunteer service to the Boy Scouts of America has been charged with sexually abusing a 16-year-old boy whom authorities say met through scouting activities. William E. Tobiasen, 57, 426 W. 30th St., pleaded innocent Wednesday in Benton County District Court to a charge of second-degree sexual abuse and a charge of contributing to the sexual delinquency of a minor.

Each charge is a misdemeanor punishable by up to one year in jail and a \$2,500 fine. The case was continued for trial, for subsequent court appearances. After the brief court appearance, Tobiasen was booked into the Benton County jail and released on his own recognizance on two conditions: that he report as soon as possible to Oregon State Hospital in Salem for a sexual evaluation to determine whether he is sexually dangerous person, and that he have no contact with the 16-year-old boy. If he is declared a sexually dangerous person, Tobiasen would be sent to the hospital for treatment.

Tobiasen is a life insurance agent for Mutual Life Insurance Co. of New York and was honored by the company in August 1983 for his volunteer work with the Oregon Trail Council of the Boy Scouts of America.

He has been involved in scouting 21 years. He has been a cubmaster and pack and troop chairman. He also has completed the scouting master's degree and received the Silver Beaver Award, the highest award given to an adult member at the Oregon Council level. He is currently a scoutmaster of a troop in Corvallis, said Ralph Brodbeck, current troopmaster of the troop. Brodbeck said Tobiasen quit participating in troop activities about 18 months ago. He was cut off from scouting entirely when scout officials learned Tobiasen was being investigated for sexual misconduct.

"It was a real shocker," Brodbeck said of the charges against Tobiasen. Brodbeck said he served as scoutmaster to Tobiasen and had camped with him. "There were things obvious that would point to anything like these things," he said.

Tobiasen also has been a member of the Adair Village City Council and planning commission. His wife, Wanda, is city clerk for Adair Village. He has four sons, three of whom are Eagle Scouts, the highest rank a Scout can attain.

Tobiasen's appearance in court followed an investigation that began May 21 when a parent of the 16-year-old boy complained to authorities, according to Stan Robson, a detective with the Benton County Sheriff's Department who is handling the case.

Although Robson wouldn't say whether the sexual misconduct with which Tobiasen is charged occurred during scouting activities, he said Tobiasen met the victim through those activities.

Court records say the sexual delinquency episode occurred Jan. 30, and the sexual abuse occurred April 28 to May 5. Sexual abuse is defined as touching sexually private parts of the body. Contributing to the sexual delinquency of a minor involves sexual activity described as deviant, including oral sex.

Although the investigation has proceeded quickly, getting the matter into court has proved more difficult.

At the request of Benton County District Attorney Peter F. Sandrock Jr., the case is being prosecuted by Michael J. Brown, Marion County district attorney. Sandrock was attending a district attorneys' conference Wednesday and was not available for comment. However, Sandrock said earlier that he thought it would be improper for his office to be involved in the prosecution because Tobiasen had participated in Sandrock's 1982 re-election campaign.

Also, Judge John S. Horton of Linn County District Court was called in to handle the case after Judge Henry R. Dickerson of Benton County District Court disqualified himself. Dickerson said Tuesday

that he asked for a Linn County judge to handle the case because he has known Tobiasen for many years and worked with him as city attorney for Adair Village.

"I've also worked with Mr. Tobiasen in Boy Scouts from time to time, and I was concerned I might not be as objective as maybe I should be," Dickerson said.

District Attorney Brown refused to discuss the details of the case.

However, he said there is a waiting list at Oregon State Hospital and it may be three weeks before Tobiasen goes there for evaluation.

The evaluation will take about four days, and Tobiasen will stay at the hospital during that time, he said.

"We expect that within the next four weeks we will have the reports back and make further appearances in court," Brown said.

Detective Robson said Tobiasen was not arrested before his appearance in court because officials were confident he would not leave the area.

Tobiasen has lived in the Corvallis area for about 20 years. His lawyer is Thomas L. Gallagher Jr., Corvallis.

## Statement About Child Abuse



Child abuse is a fact in our society and a matter of great concern for most parents throughout our country. The Boy Scouts of America shares this concern.

For more than 76 years, Scouting has taught its members basic life values. Today those members make up a large percentage of society's adult population who are also shocked by the magnitude of the child abuse problem. To them, fairness in dealing with others is embedded in the precepts of the Scout Oath and Law which make child abuse unthinkable and violence unnecessary. Their concern is helping society come to grips with the problem.

Parents react to child abuse in a variety of ways from outrage, to fear, to disbelief, to indifference. Some have the notion that their children will somehow be exempt from this danger. None of these approaches is really useful.

A far more sensible idea, and one that Scouting has long advocated, is to become actively involved with your children. Get to know their leaders, join in planning events, become acquainted with other parents and their children. At home, talk about the meaning of the Cub Scout Promise or the Scout Oath and Law and how they serve as a guide to a clean and healthy life.

Throughout its history, the Boy Scouts of America has been allied with churches, synagogues, schools, and civic groups in an effort to strengthen the ethical and moral values of our children. These organizations need to choose Scout leaders whom they consider positive role models for our children in furthering traditional family values. As a parent you can play an important part in the selection process.

One of the best strategies for child abuse prevention is for parents to have an ongoing communication with their children. Often this is difficult, especially for working parents and parents with adolescents. But it is worthwhile to talk to your children every day and take time to listen and observe. Encourage your children to share their concerns and problems with you. By doing this you are not an intruder, but a concerned parent.

Explain that their bodies belong to them alone and that they have the right to say, "No!" to anyone who might try to touch them. Remind them that if this happens, they should tell you immediately. Assure

your children that you will never be angry with them for telling the truth in such instances.

Tell your children that some adults may try to hurt children and make them do things they don't feel comfortable doing. Often these people call what they're doing a secret between themselves and the child.

Explain that some adults may even threaten children by saying that their parents may be hurt or killed if the child ever shares the secret. Emphasize that an adult who does something like this is doing something that is wrong.

Tell your children that an adult whom they know and trust, perhaps someone in a position of authority (like a babysitter, an uncle, a teacher, or even a policeman), might try to do something like this. But try not to scare your children—emphasize that the vast majority of people never do this and that most adults are deeply concerned about protecting children from harm.

Being abused is a secret young people feel they must keep because of threats, embarrassment, lack of knowledge, fear of harming a loved one, and the fear that they will not be believed. The effects of this secret abuse are long-lasting and cause severe psychological damage.

Medical and educational therapy is needed to restore individual children to health. For its part, Scouting will continue to improve the quality of life for all youth by:

- Encouraging civic-minded organizations to use the Scouting program for their youth.
- Stressing the importance for these organizations to select and commission only leaders who are positive role models.
- Placing emphasis on timeless human virtues that overcome selfishness.
- Teaching that the pursuit of happiness mostly is achieved through helping others.
- Providing constructive, non-threatening experiences that build self-esteem and self-reliance.
- Instilling a value system in our youth that includes duty to God and country and a respect for the rights of others.

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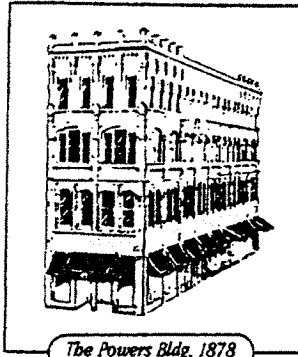
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
